## LANDON HERE FOR ADDRESS

Crowds Cheer G. O. P. Candidate as He Arrives; To Review Parade.

about Indiana political conditions as the two Hoosiers reported on the campaign's success.

Chief Morrissey, in civilian clothing, directed housing of the nominees on the third floor.

The state committee announced that the telegram had been received from Henry L. Mencken, incoquistic editor and lecturer, that he would join the Landon party in Indianapolis.

The Governor's special train was met in Terre Haute at 7:40 a. m. today by Republican state committee members, candidates and Mr. Morgan.

Party attaches and state committee members reported that the throat ailment, which caused him to rest prior to his Oklahoma City address, would not prevent his address here tonight. Indiana Republicans cut conferences to a minimum in order to save his strength.

A scheduled press conference was not held.

### Meals in Private

Republican leaders said that his noon as well as his evening meal would be served in his hotel room.

The Kansan said he would visit four meetings in the Claypool of farm, township trustees and business men, and Indiana mayors, but would not speak.

Prior to the parade, Gov. Landon was to attend a meeting of Landon-Knox club in Tomlinson Hall. His visits there and to the farm rally were to be merely in the way of greeting, G. O. P. leaders said.

### Farm Meeting Set

The farm meeting was held in the Claypool's Chateau room. Speakers at the meeting were Clifford R. Hope, of the Republican national committee's farm division, Mr. Springer and Mrs. J. C. McKinney, woman's page editor of the Indianapolis (Kans.) Gazette.

Tonight's address at the Coliseum was to be heard, leaders said, by 12,000 to 15,000 persons.

Mr. Landon is to leave at 2:15 p. m. Sunday for a final campaign tour of the state, starting with addresses in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and New York City, and shorter stops in Baltimore, Md., on Monday and Trenton, N. J., Wednesday.

The Coliseum has been decorated in flag bunting. Workmen today finished accommodations for press representatives who are traveling with the Landon party. Loud speakers will carry his address to any overflow crowd.

The parade, which was to begin at 2:30 p. m. at 16th and West-sts., was expected to take more than an hour to pass the reviewing stand on the balcony of the English hotel.

### Big Parade Planned

Elephants, a calliope, laboring men in overalls, bands and drum corps, floats, assault the New Deal and its policies, with hundreds of marchers and automobiles were to be in the line of March.

Republicans of Marion County and the Twelfth and Eleventh Districts were to lead all congressional districts.

Gen. Tyndall, parade chairman, announced one major change in the route. The cavalcade is to march down Illinois from Indianapolis instead of south on Capitol-st., as originally planned. The parade then is to go east on Washington-st.


The complete revised parade routing is as follows:

Start at 16th and West-sts., then move south on West-st. to Indianapolis; southeast on Indiana-av to Illinois-st., south on Illinois-st. to Washington-av; east on Washington-av to Pennsylvania-av, north on Pennsylvania-av to Market-st.; west on Market-st. to Circle; left around the Circle past the English Hotel, reviewing stand; north on Meridian-st. to stand near the World War Memorial Plaza.

## NATION PAYS HOMAGE AT BIER OF COUZENS

DETROIT, Oct. 24.—City, state and nation paid homage to Senator James Couzens today at the City Hall where his body will lie in state in the office he occupied as Mayor from 1918 to 1922.

City and county offices were closed today and will remain closed Monday when the 64-year-old senior Michigan Senator will be buried. Funeral services will be held Monday at 2:30 p. m. at the Couzens country home, Wabek, in suburban Bloomfield Hills. The Rev. S. S. Marquis, rector of Christ Church, Cranbrook, will officiate. The body will be interred in the family mausoleum in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Attorneys for Melvin Kaufman, Chicago, who was indicted on a narcotics charge, filed a demur in the case today. Hearing on the demur is set for Nov. 9.

Five persons, two of them from Indianapolis, were arraigned today before Federal Court Judge Robert C. Baltzell.

Charles N. Reed, Indianapolis, pleaded guilty to a charge of federal narcotics act violations. He is to be sentenced Friday.

Richard Wilkerson, Indianapolis, and Glen Cochran, Anderson, pleaded not guilty to postal law violation charges. Trial dates for both were set for Nov. 9. John Anderson, Terre Haute, also pleaded not guilty to mail fraud charges. His trial is to be set later.

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
