

# PEACE ORGANIZATIONS ARRANGE ARMISTICE DAY DEMONSTRATION

## Non-Sectarian Service Is Set by Committee

Early Morning Program Is to Be on Monument Circle.

Indianapolis peace and young people's organizations, in co-operation with civic and church leaders, are arranging for an anti-war demonstration Armistice Day in Monument Circle.

Non-sectarian in nature, but religious in form, the program, according to Martz Lewis, arrangements committee chairman, is to be on the theme: "World Youth Building a Warless World."

The demonstration is to be held at 7 a. m. Wednesday, and is to be under direction of Ronald Boughton, of the Y. M. C. A. The "leader-response" method is to be used in the meeting, Mr. Lewis said.

Through a public address system, Mr. Boughton is to ask questions on war and peace to which the group are to respond in unison. It is expected to be one of the largest anti-war demonstrations ever held here, Mr. Lewis claimed.

Music is to be provided by the Indianapolis Civic Choir and direction of Floyd Jones, director. Members of the Butler University band are to furnish accompaniment.

Mr. Lewis said every Indianapolis resident is invited to participate in the service.

## Co-operating Groups

Organizations which have offered to lend support include Epworth League, Friends Church, Emergency Peace Campaign, Disciples of Christ, International Council of Religious Education, International Goodwill Commission of the Church Federation of Indianapolis and the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Lewis has been assisted in program preparations by Miss Maxine Malcolm.

Miss Myrtle Powell is to be the featured speaker at a second peace meeting in the Y. M. C. A. at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, it was announced.

She is to arrive in Indianapolis tomorrow after attending the World Youth Congress in Geneva, Switzerland. An employee of the Indiana Bell Telephone Co., Miss Powell was one of the representatives from the United States at the conference.

Rabbi Morris M. Feuerlicht, of the Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation, is to give the invocation, and Bishop Joseph M. Francis, of All Saints' Cathedral, is to give the benediction.

## THE CHRISTIAN WARFARE

Devotional Reading: II Corinthians 1:3-11

International Union Sunday School Lesson for Nov. 8:

The plan of our lessons has associated the historical reference to Paul's visits to different cities, as recorded in the Books of Acts, with passages in Paul's letters to churches that were directed to the Christians in each particular city.

Here we have a striking passage concerning Paul's work as a preacher in Ephesus, and along with it the great exhortation to Christian warfare which Paul addressed to the Ephesians in the sixth chapter of his Epistle.

Ephesus was a city of great commercial importance but its distinction was not confined to its commerce and wealth.

The Temple of Diana in Ephesus was the ancient and wealthy city of the world, so that it was not without warrant that in their uproar against Paul, the people cried, "Great is Diana of the Ephesians."

It will be recalled that the silver image of Diana, the goddess of the Temple of Diana, were much concerned over the success of Paul's attack on idolatry, because they believed that their craft was in danger.

It would have moved people greatly if the apostle had said, "We are in danger of losing trade." Like many others who have traded profitably in religion they sought to stir up violence against Paul by appeal to religious prejudice.

WE ought to grasp here a very definite sense of the faith and courage of this man Paul. He came into an ancient and wealthy city, and in the very shadows of this temple, in the midst of a people who were enthusiastic about it, and its worship—told the simple story of

The mission is being sponsored locally by the Church Federation of Indianapolis under the direction of Dr. Ernest N. Evans, executive secretary.

Details are being worked out by a committee headed by the Rev. Clive McGuire, Indianapolis Baptist Association executive secretary.

With few exceptions, the mission is to take the form of nightly sermons by the church pastor. Ministers are being asked to keep all churches lighted during the night while the mission is carried out.

Many pastors have announced that mission ceremonies and services have been arranged jointly for churches in the same vicinity. Union services are to be held throughout the county also, Mr. McGuire said.

Mr. McGuire also stated that committee members were preparing a system for perpetuation of the mission in the future.

Special broadcasts are being arranged for the week of Nov. 15 to 22.

## Local Pastor's Theology Book Is Commended

Dean F. D. Kershner Lauds 'Christianity in America.'

One of the outstanding books of the year in the theological field appeared a short time ago from the Abingdon Press, under the title "Christianity in America."

The author is Dr. E. G. Homrighausen, pastor of the Carrollton Avenue Reformed Church in this city and for the past three years lecturer in the department of church history of the Butler University College of Religion.

Competent critics are agreed that Dr. Homrighausen's work may well furnish a starting point for the development of a real and vital school of American theology.

There is much need for systematic thinking in this field, and there has been entirely too little of it. As the author of this work remarks, in spite of its progress in other directions, America has produced only one world-recognized theologian, Jonathan Edwards. Edwards, it also will be recalled, dates back to the eighteenth century.

Handled Without Gloves

Dr. Homrighausen handles the current situation entirely without gloves. He calls a spade a spade and he makes the far fly in a good many different directions. The flabbiness, shallowness, materialism and pettiness of current religious thinking, are portrayed in colors of stark reality.

Here there is, of course, no little resemblance to Karl Barth and the crisis school of theology in Germany with which the author is so well acquainted. Homrighausen, like Barth, reacts against the shallow pragmatism in America. He spends most of his energies planning for a new war before it has even partially recovered from the self-inflicted wounds of a previous conflict.

"Christianity in America" is a stimulating book for laymen and church workers as well as ministers. It has plenty of taboos in it, and is emphatically one of the present-day volumes to which you may object but which you can not afford to neglect.
