

123 CITIZENSHIP AWARDS ISSUED HERE THIS YEAR

German Immigrants Lead List of New Americans, Bureau Reports.

A total of 123 persons were granted American citizenship in 1936 through the United States Immigration and Naturalization bureau here, a report showed today.

Two examinations were conducted in Indianapolis by W. A. Kiefer, Cincinnati, assistant director of immigration and naturalization.

Immigrants from Germany led the list with a total of 44 persons receiving their final papers during 1936. Four persons were denied citizenship.

Occupationally, house wives were most numerous with 38. The most noticeable diversification of employment was found among the German immigrants. Occupations ranged from bartenders to photo-engineers. Six former Italians gave their occupations as terrazzo floor workers. A physiotherapy student and a rabbi also received citizenship.

PUBLIC DUTIES TO BE ASSUMED AT CEREMONIES

Officials of County and State Are to Begin Terms Today.

Justices Walter E. Treanor and Curtis W. Roll of the Indiana Supreme Court are to give the oaths of office to each other. Miss Emma May, Supreme and Appellate Courts' reporter, also is to be sworn in.

Officials elected Nov. 3 whose terms begin today are Prosecutor Herbert M. Spencer, Sheriff Otto Ray, County Commissioner Dow Vories, County Surveyor Herbert Bloemker and Coroner E. R. Wilson.

Oscar Hegemier, chief deputy prosecutor and 25 other deputies are to swear in with Mr. Spencer.

Thirty-seven deputy sheriffs are to take oaths with Mr. Ray.

Municipal Court Judge Dewey Meyers accepted an invitation to administer the oath to Mr. Ray.

Two other county officials re-elected Nov. 3 will not start their new terms until Jan. 1, 1938. They are Frank McKinney, treasurer and John Newhouse, commissioner.






