STATE FARMERS TO ASSEMBLE AT PURDUE MONDAY

Diversified Program Arranged for Annual 5-Day Conference.

Farmers from every county in Indiana are expected to assemble on the Purdue University campus next Monday for the opening of the annual five-day agricultural conference.

Conference officials said today they anticipated the attendance would exceed the 6845 mark set last year.

The conference program is to consist of technical instruction in the

morning on various phases of agriculture, a discussion of subjects of general interest in the afternoon and entertainment in the evening. Demonstrations and exhibits of farm water systems, tractors and power equipment, farm machinery, terracing machinery and electrical farm equipment, are to be held daily in the old Agricultural Engineering Building.

Speakers Are Listed

Poultry, grain and livestock exhibits are to be conducted in the Home Economics, Poultry, Union and University Farm Buildings.

Monday's program is to include talks by Mrs. J. D. Hoffman, of West Lafayette, on "Bringing the Outdoors Into the House," and by R. B. Hull, of Purdue, on rural electrification. Buyers are to be present at the session to discuss what they want when they buy at markets.

Other speakers on the week's program are: L. V. Sheridan, Indianapolis, who is to speak on the work of the Indiana State Planning Board; C. V. Gregory, editor of

Prairie Farmer, who is to give observations he made while a member of President Roosevelt's commission to study co-operatives; W. A. Cochel, editor of the weekly edition of the Kansas City Star, who is to appear on the program for the Live Stock Breeders' Association and general livestock sessions, and A. G. Phillips, formerly head of the Purdue poultry department.

Corn Kings to Be Honored

The 1936 Indiana corn kings are to be recognized at a special meeting of the Indiana Corn Growers' Association Thursday evening following the organization's annual dinner. President E. C. Elliott of Purdue is to present the awards.

The annual meeting of the Indiana Home Economics Association is to be held Thursday noon. Following the meeting, Dr. Viva Boothe of Ohio State University is to speak on "The Consumer Takes a Bow."

Eighteen home economics and agricultural associations are to hold their annual conventions in connection with the conference, it was announced.

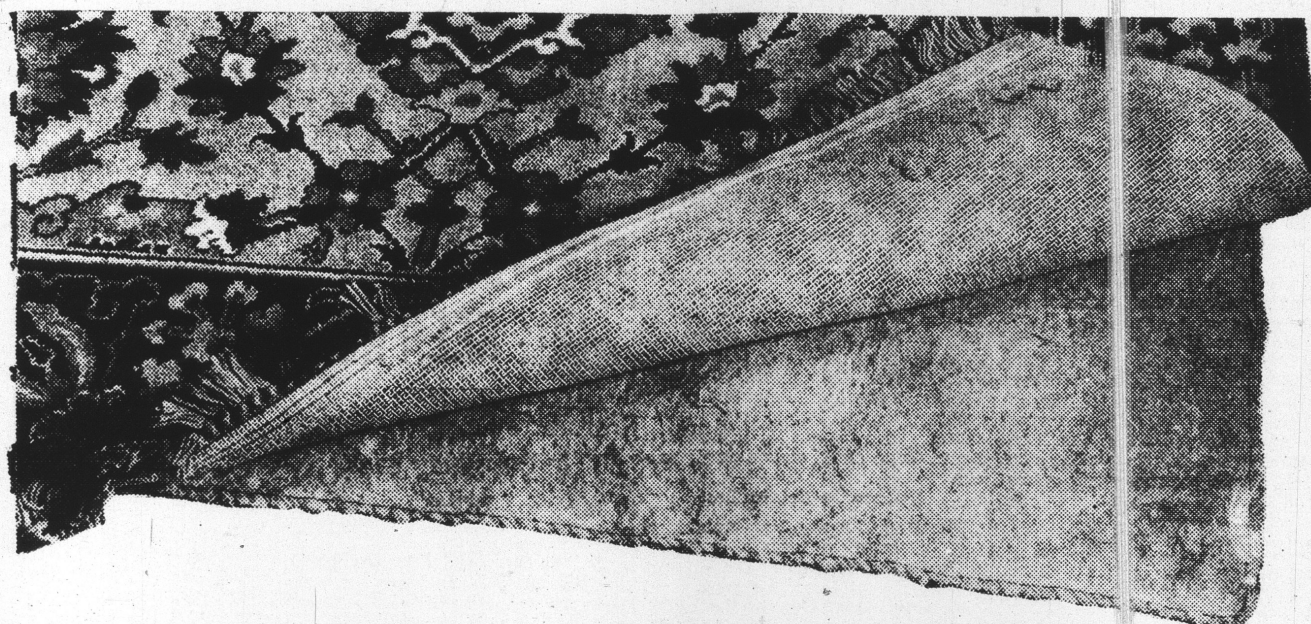
