MISSISSIPPI HITS 47.8 AT MEMPHIS

Army Engineers Co-ordinate Plans After Break in Tennessee Levee.

ened flood wall, praying that doom and destruction would pass it by. While the Army engineers studied its every resource in the Memphis district, the upper and Mid-Ohio Valleys emerged courageously from the worst flood in its history. At Louisville, 12 square miles were quarantined.

The Mississippi gave one wretched push yesterday against a two-mile sandbag wall, linking two levees at Bessie, Tenn., and broke through to spread water across the lowland near the Kentucky-Tennessee line. Today that water was finding its way back to the main channel, two miles downstream, but for a time it threatened Tiptonville, Tenn., and Reelfoot Lake.

Looking at the entire 1200-mile levee system, the break at Bessie was a minor occurrence, but it sent 600 men reeling backward to scramble aboard boats. At one point the water came through seven feet deep, and waves sloped a foot and a half deep across the regular levees at each end of the sandbag wall.

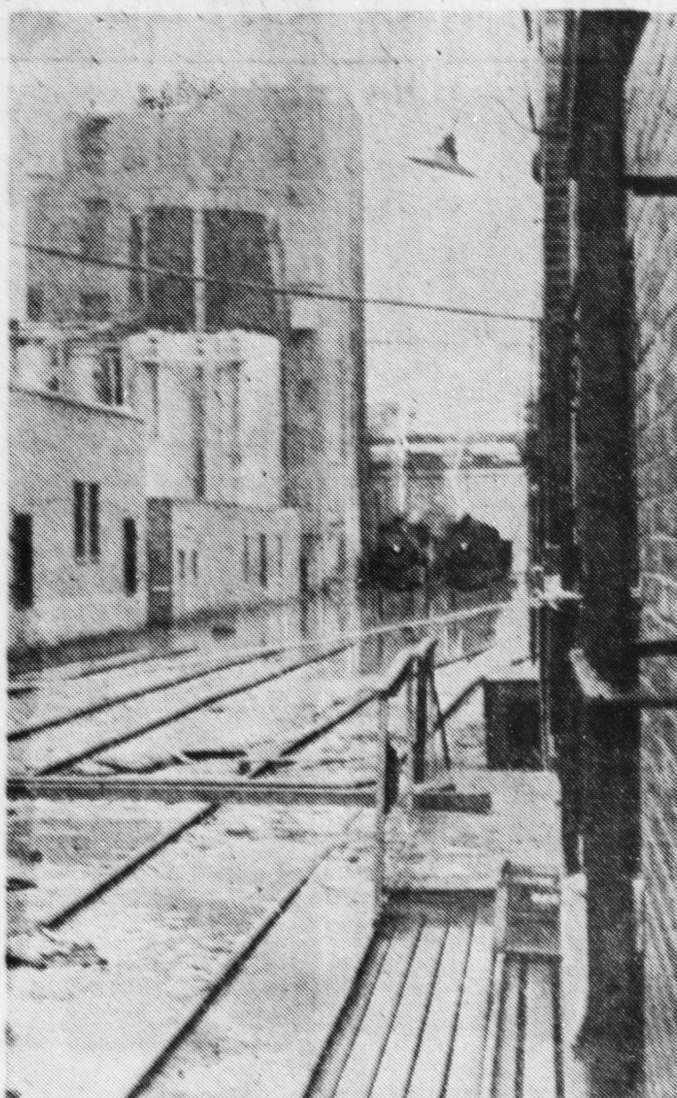
Fearful that such a break might happen anywhere, Army engineers devised a co-ordinated plan of campaign and issued a bulletin concerning it.

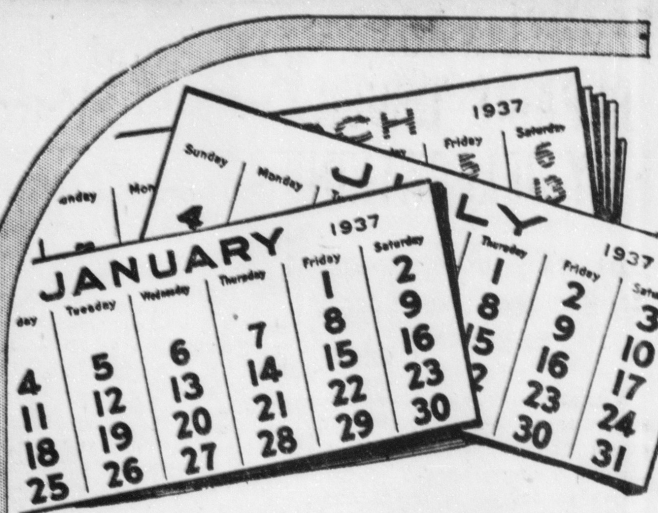

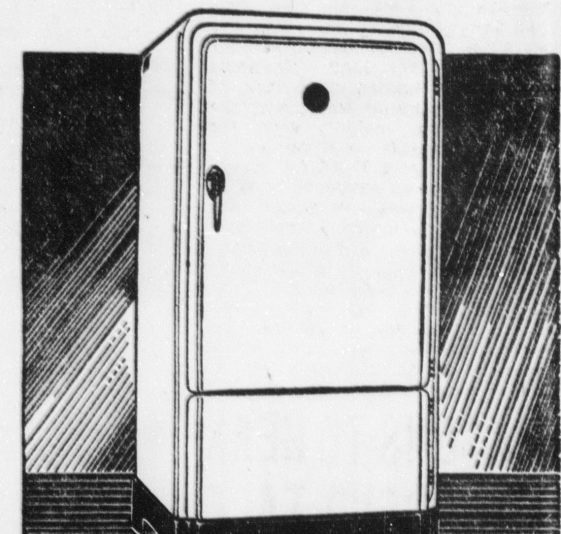

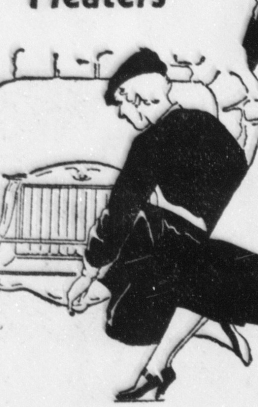
