

FRANKLIN ROAD REPAIRS URGED BY DELEGATION

Cars and Trucks Damaged By Bad Conditions, County Board Told.

A delegation of 25 Franklin Township citizens appeared before County Commissioners today, demanding emergency repair work. "We are tearing up our cars and trucks trying to drive over the roads in our township," Merrill Harmon told the commissioners. "There are holes in the roads out there as deep as one foot in some places," he said. Commissioners said road crews had been doing everything possible to keep highways passable.

Lack of Money Cited

Clarence Wheatley, president of the commissioners, said road crews had been ordered to work the highways every day the weather permits. Commissioner John Newhouse told the delegation that lack of money was another reason why the commissioners couldn't keep the roads in passable condition.

"We only got \$139,000 for county roads in 1936 as compared to twice that much several years ago," Mr. Newhouse explained. "We have about reached the end of our financial rope with the state law moratorium on road bond issues." Hope for relief was expressed in a new arrangement of gasoline tax money whereby the county would get more funds this year.

Husband of 9-Year-Old Irked 'Cause 'Furriners' Bother Him

Child-Bride Cuddles Doll as Strangers Invade Cabin and Officers Talk Annulment.

SNEEDVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 1.—Charlie Johns, raw-boned, 22-year-old mountaineer—bewildered and angry because of interest attracted by his marriage to 9-year-old golden-haired Eunice Winstead—today barred reporters from his father-in-law's three-room cabin where he was "honeymooning."

Standing in front of the crude dwelling in the Clinch Mountains, the six-foot mountaineer, with grizzled hair and a weathered face, demanded that reporters "keep away." "There ain't a goin' be no more pictures and stories about this. It ain't a goin' to keep up." The slight, blue-eyed girl bride, who looked even younger than her 9 years, cuddled a doll which Johns gave her for Christmas and wept while her husband ordered strangers away.

Johns and the girl's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Winstead, considered the marriage their own affair and were amazed that anyone would intrude. They were alarmed by reports that clergymen and social workers planned to attempt annulment and to place Eunice under a guardian.

The district's Solicitor General, J. W. Wolfenbarger, studied law books to determine a legal means of annulling the marriage. He was in Newport, where court was in session.

Minimum Not Fixed

Those attempting to force annulment, however, apparently were blocked. W. H. Eagle, assistant Tennessee Attorney General, in Nashville, said there is no minimum marriage age in the State's code. Eunice's age was given as 18 on the marriage license, but her parents admitted she is only nine.

MADRID FORCES PUSH DRIVE ON BASQUE FRONT

Loyalists Drawing Closer to Burgos, Rebel Capital, Is Report.

MADRID, Feb. 1.—Government troops pushed a triple offensive today on the Basque front while activity in the Madrid area was confined, except for minor clashes on the western front, to the Arrancuez area south of the city.

The Basque militia, drawing ever closer to Burgos, the Rebel capital 130 miles north of Madrid, attacked in the Elgeta, Eibar and Ordenna sectors. Government troops, aided by the flooding Manzanares River which filled rebel trenches, occupied both sides of the river today from the Toledo Bridge to Frenchman's Bridge. Periodic clashes in this sector, described as "battles" by excited Madrileños, were dismissed by military men as routine skirmishes.

Hint New Arms Purchase in U. S.

PARIS, Feb. 1.—Spanish Nationalist circles asserted today that Maj. Fernandez Bolanos, military attache of the Loyalist Spanish Embassy, would arrive in New York on the liner Berengaria Wednesday to take delivery of American arms and munitions.

According to these informants the munitions order includes 50,000 rifles and 50,000,000 rounds of ammunition for the Loyalist Government. Spaniards said they were interested in the situation because of the American law banning shipment of arms to either Nationalists or Loyalists in the civil war.

Seizure of French Ship Is Claimed

He gave no details other than it carried 650 tons of wheat destined for the Government forces.

TAX MORATORIUM BLANKS READY SOON

Law Grants Payment Plan To Avoid Sale.

Marion County taxpayers who wish to file requests under the new Indiana emergency tax moratorium law may obtain pro forma blanks Feb. 15 according to Treasurer Frank E. McKinney.

The new law provides that all persons whose taxes are delinquent as of Jan. 1 may pay them in 12 semi-annual equal installments, starting in May, 1938.



6 STATES PLAN CONFERENCE ON FLOOD CONTROL

Sessions Will Open Friday in Columbus, O.; Ex-Governor McNutt to Preside.

Indiana is to be represented at a conference of the Council of State Governments in Columbus, O., Friday and Saturday to seek future ways to bridge the Ohio River and forestall flood devastation. Henry W. Toll, Chicago, executive director of the council, issued a call for the conference.

Other States to be represented include: Kentucky, Ohio, Virginia, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Tennessee and Illinois, although they have not established interstate commissions on co-operation, will be invited to send representatives.

Former Governor Paul V. McNutt, council president, is expected to attend and preside at the sessions. The purpose of the conference, according to Mr. Toll, is not to solve immediate relief problems but to weave a broad-gauge planning program into a co-ordinated structure of State legislative, executive and administrative powers to attack flood control at its source.

In addition to former Governor McNutt, State Senator Jacob Weiss (D, Indianapolis), Senate Committee on Interstate Co-operation chairman, and Rep. William E. Treadway (D, Spencer), chairman of a similar House committee, also are to attend the conference.

COUNCIL MAY DOUBLE CIRCUS LICENSE FEE

A license fee of \$200 a day, instead of \$100 as at present, will be required of circuses visiting Indianapolis if the City Council, meeting tonight, approves a pending ordinance.

An amendment may be added holding any circus responsible for damages to streets caused by its trucks.

Other ordinances would allocate \$158,821 of gasoline tax revenue from the State to various departments in a routine action, allocate \$5000 to the Game-well Department for several additional traffic signals at intersections, and appropriate \$2080 in the Park Department for services of Lawrence V. Sheridan as a consultant in directing development of the West Side.
