

JOHN G. SCIFRES DIES FOLLOWING BRIEF SICKNESS

Physician Had Practiced in Indianapolis for 30 Years.

Dr. John Grover Scifres, a practicing physician in Indianapolis for nearly 30 years, died yesterday in Methodist Hospital following a brief illness. He was 52.

Dr. Scifres, who lived in Breckenwood, was graduated from Purdue University and the Indiana University School of Medicine. He maintained offices at 156 1/2 N. Illinois St.

Funeral services are to be held at 2 p. m. tomorrow in the Little York Christian Church. Burial is to be in Little York.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Margaret Scifres; a son, Duane; two stepdaughters, Joellen Schuck and Georganna Schuck, all of Indianapolis and five brothers, Joe Scifres, Little Rock, George and Charles Scifres, Enid, Okla., and Thomas and James Scifres, Long Beach, Cal.

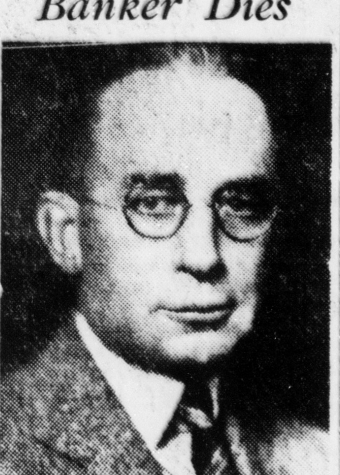
