

POLICE CHARGE BURGLAR USED CYCLE TO FLEE

Allege Red Wagon Trailer Served to Carry Stolen Goods.

An alleged burglar who used a bicycle, police said, to escape with stolen goods, was being held today for investigation.

Paul Carlos, 208 Hendricks place, told police someone had broken into his garage. In the alley, they found a bicycle with a red wagon trailer.

Police went to a garage across the alley where they found a 16-year-old youth who confessed, they said, to breaking into five garages.

RELIEF FEUD FLARES IN TRIPLE SLAYING

DENVER, Colo., March 3.—A feud between a public welfare official and organized relief clients flared today after the slaying of three men at relief headquarters Monday by a disgruntled Negro.

Police guards were posted at all relief offices and state legislators, groping with the relief problem, instructed sergeants-at-arms to watch spectators closely and search anyone who looked suspicious.

The killer, Frank Bailey, was at one time on the executive committee of the Colorado Workers Alliance. He denied that organization was implicated in his outbreak.

CONFESSED KILLER NOW DENIES GUILT

By United Press. MAR DEL PLATA, Argentina, March 3.—Gancedo, who confessed the kidnapping of 2-year-old Eugenio Perera, heir to a great cattle fortune, denied last night that he had committed the crime.

The denial came during a reconstruction of the kidnapping at the scene of the crime.

"Do you want me to continue this farce?" Gancedo asked detectives. "It is all a novel."

ALEXANDRIA STRIKE PARLEYS ARRANGED

INDIANA STEEL PLANT IS TO HIRE MORE MEN

The employment roll of the Inland plant will be increased from 12,000 to 14,000 men effective March 16, he asserted.

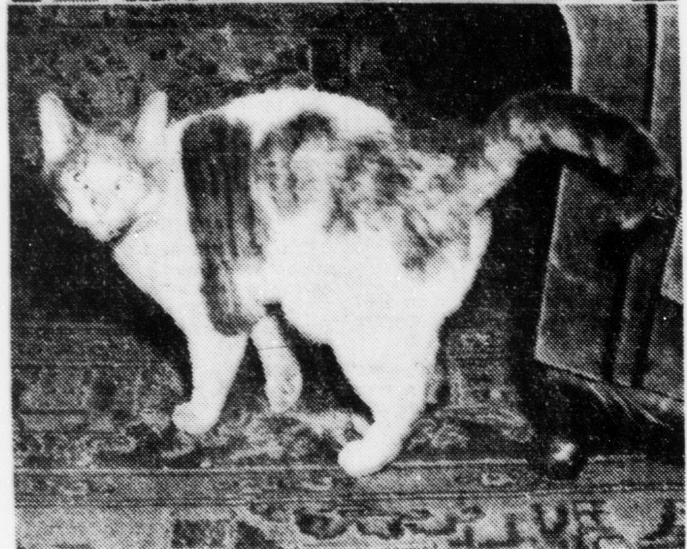
RUSSIA PRAISED IN TALK

Sit-Down Widows to Demand Collective Bargaining in Love

1500 Ordered to Call Strike or Call Minister; Rolling Pins May Follow, Leader Says.

By United Press. CHICAGO, March 3.—Mrs. Nellie Brooke Stull, chubby protector of middle-aged love, today ordered a mass sit-down strike of 1500 widows on April 1.

"We believe," she said, "that every woman is entitled to a man and a home. We demand the right of collective bargaining in romance."

Mrs. Stull, vivacious national president and founder of the Widow and Widowers' Club, asserted that the date—"All Fools' Day"—was mere coincidence.

"In two weeks," she said, "we'll sweep the country. Already we're thinking of organizing a men's auxiliary."

"If we get enough men, we'll call off the strike and call in a minister."

MRS. STULL, who hails from Elvira, O., said the strike will be called simultaneously in five cities—Chicago, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Kansas City.

"I got this idea one day at lunch," she said.

"I was buttering a roll when it came to me—the way to a man's heart is through his stomach."
