

POLICE CHARGE BURGLAR USED CYCLE TO FLEE

Allege Red Wagon Trailer Served to Carry Stolen Goods.

An alleged burglar who used a bicycle, police said, to escape with stolen goods, was being held today for investigation.

RELIEF FEUD FLARES IN TRIPLE SLAYING

DENVER, Colo., March 3.—A feud between public welfare officials and organized relief clients flared today over the slaying of three men at relief headquarters Monday by a disgruntled Negro.

Police guards were posted at all relief offices and state legislators, groping with the relief problem, instructed sergeants-at-arms to watch spectators closely and search anyone who looked suspicious.

The killer, Frank Bailey, was at one time on the executive committee of the Colorado Workers Alliance. He denied that organization was implicated in his outbreak.

CONFESSED KILLER NOW DENIES GUILT

INDIANA STEEL PLANT IS TO HIRE MORE MEN
