HEALTH DEFINED AS ACTIVITY CAPACITY

Mixed Recreation Favored By Chicago Teacher.

The capacity for activity, both mental and physical, is the modern definition for health, declared Prof. C. D. Glaugue, physical education director at George Williams College, Chicago, in an address before 23 boys' clubs in the Y. M. C. A. last night.

"More emphasis will be placed in the future upon the physical side of life, dignifying health as never before," Prof. Glaugue said.

"Correlation is becoming more prominent in schools and informal education agencies," he continued. "Mixing of the sexes in play will bring about a greater respect of one for the other and will have a good effect in helping to solve moral problems."

LAMONT SUMMONED IN SENATE HEARING

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Thomas W. Lamont, partner in J. P. Morgan & Co., was summoned before the Senate Railroad Investigating Committee today to relate his firm's dealings with the Van Sweringen interests in the latter 1920's.

The Senate investigations sought particularly to obtain information concerning the part played by the "House of Morgan" in floating securities of the Allegheny Corp., holding company for railroad interests of the late Van Sweringen brothers, in 1929 and 1930.

Joseph R. Swann, former president of the Guaranty Co., New York investment house, and Harold S. Stanley, partner of Morgan, Stanley & Co., Morgan brokerage concern, also were called.

WOMAN SOUGHT FOR STRIKE SLAYING QUIZ

HACKENSACK, N. J., March 3.—A woman associate of New York union leaders was sought for questioning today in the Norman Redwood murder investigation.

The woman was said to be a beauty shop employee who shared the confidences of persons close to Redwood, leader of a sandhog's union which called a strike of 700 tunnel excavators employed by Samuel Rosoff, millionaire New York subway builder.

C., has fallen the lot of deciding on two important New Deal issues involving Federal financing of power centers which, it is alleged, would compete with private companies. The cases are based on the \$40,000,000 Buzzards Roost and Santee-Cooper projects in South Carolina. The Buzzards Roost case, once before the Supreme Court, was remanded to the lower court for retrial.

Steel Pact Text

PITTSBURGH, March 3.—The text of the contract signed by Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corp. and the Steel Workers Organizing Committee follows:

This agreement dated March 2, 1937, between Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corp. and the Steel Workers Organizing Committee, on behalf of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers of North America, employed by the corporation.

1. The corporation recognizes the Steel Workers' Organizing Committee, or its successor, as the collective bargaining agency for those employees of the corporation who are members of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers of North America (hereafter referred to as the union). The corporation recognizes and will not interfere with the right of its employees to become members of the union or its successor. There shall be no discrimination, interference or coercion by the corporation or any of its agents against any member because of membership in the union, or its successor. The Steel Workers' Organizing Committee or its successor, agrees not to intimidate or coerce employees into membership or to solicit membership on corporation time or property.

2. Effective March 16, 1937, there shall be an increase in wages of 10 cents an hour on all rates which are at present \$4.20 a day, or a minimum for this classification of \$5 a day of eight hours. Such classifications now receiving less than \$4.20 a day or less than 52½ cents per hour shall be increased 10 cents per hour. All other classifications shall be equitably adjusted in accordance with the provisions of section four of this agreement.

3. Effective March 16, 1937 there shall be established an eight-hour day, 40-hour week. Time and one-half shall be paid for all overtime in excess of eight hours in any one day, and for all overtime in excess of 40 hours in any one week.

4. A joint committee representing the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corp. and the S. W. O. C. shall meet not later than March 10, 1937, for the purpose of effectuating a written agreement on working conditions, application of wage rates, hours, rules and a method for adjudication of disputes arising under the terms of the agreement and which agreement shall incorporate the terms of this agreement.

5. The agreement effectuated pursuant to section four hereof shall be in force Feb. 28, 1938.

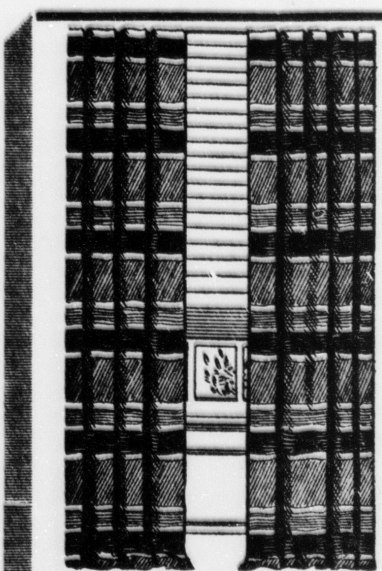

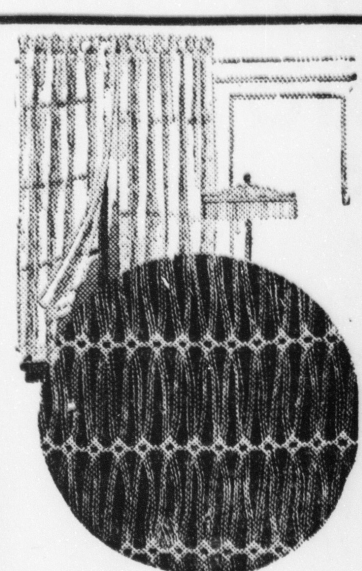

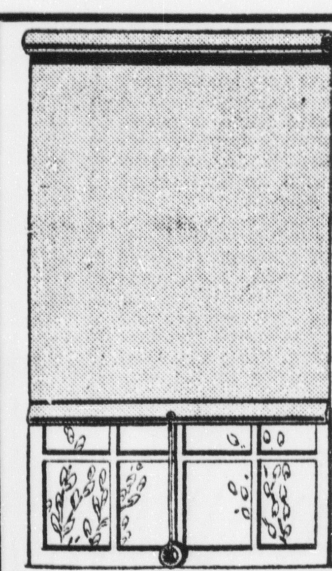
