

ADLER TO TALK ON THEOLOGY AT SUNDAY FORUM

Chicago University Professor on Program for Catholic Meeting.

Dr. Mortimer J. Adler, University of Chicago, former Columbia University professor of philosophy and assistant director of the People's Institute of New York, is to speak Sunday night at the Catholic Forum in the Civic Theatre.

He is to discuss "Theology, the Queen of the Sciences."

Dr. Adler is a professor without an assigned department. At Chicago University, he and President Robert M. Hutchins conduct a class in "Classics of the Western World." The class, handled as a round-table conference, is unusual in that no "direct teaching" is involved.

There are no texts and no set questions. The function of the two instructors is to stimulate discussion of the classics, either by asking leading questions or by arguing between themselves until the students are drawn into the argument.

Dr. Adler, who is especially interested in medieval and scholastic philosophy, spoke here before the 1936 Catholic Forum sponsored by the local International Federation of Catholic Alumnae chapter.

Although associated with the progressive education plan of the University of Chicago for several years, Dr. Adler is one of the country's foremost exponents of general classical education.

Dr. M. Joseph Barry is to preside at the forum which will follow Dr. Adler's address.

KENTUCKY GOVERNOR BACKING FLOOD BILL

Chandler Answers Minton's Offer to Participate.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Governor A. B. Chandler, Kentucky, today added his name to the list of those ready to be represented here in support of the Minton-Crowe \$50,000,000 Flood Rehabilitation Bill. Those answering Senator Sherman Minton's invitation to participate now include Governors of Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Illinois, Missouri and Arkansas.

Senator Minton said he expected hearings on the measure, which would make grants on the basis of damage done in each of the nine flooded states, to be scheduled after the St. Louis flood conference March 12.

RED CROSS SPENDS

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HOOSIER CIRCUS OUT TO CAPTURE BIG TOP HONORS

It's Stupendous and Colossal, But Ringling Supremacy Is Threatened.

NEW YORK, March 3.—The undisputed—its colossal, fantasmagorical, titanic and fantastic, folks—supremacy of the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus was threatened today for the first time within memory of its oldest elephant.

Mr. Jesse Adkins blew in from Indiana with his knee-high sombrero and intimidated, with a few well-chosen superlatives, that the country is going to be treated to a first-rate "circus war" along with its spangled ladies, smelly camels and pink lemonade.

Messrs. Adkins and Zack Terrell are the "Cole Brothers" of the Cole Brothers-Clyde Beatty Circus. Mr. Beatty is an animal trainer named Beatty.

The Cole-Beatty Circus, run by a crew of old-timers who quit Ringling Brothers, has been a success in the Midwest for two seasons, but on March 18 it will open "under roof" in New York for the first time in defiant competition with what Dexter Fellows fondly calls "the greatest show on earth."

Four-Week Run

Cole Brothers-Clyde Beatty will have a four-week run at the old Hippodrome while Ringling Brothers does business at Madison Square Garden, 15 minutes away.

For 18 years the combined Ringling-Barnum and Bailey circus has had a virtual monopoly on big-time circus trade. Sells-Floto tried fighting the "big show" a decade ago, was swallowed up by The Buffalo Bills, Forepaigs, Robinsons, Paddy Ryans tried it, too.

They all "came a Patsy," which in sawdust slang means went broke.

No other circus ever stood up against "the greatest show on earth" that was started by the seven Brothers Ringling from Baraboo, Wis. Other outfits had elephants that were less baggy in

the pants and more daring wild animal acts, but the Ringlings had that thing called "flash" that is to the big top what sex appeal is to Hollywood.

Guffaw for Threat

Mr. Fellows, Ringling's veteran press agent who is more of a fixture than the bearded lady, met the threat of a "circus war" with a short and guffaw.

"For 40 years Ringling Brothers has been the king of the circus world and you can bet your last calico that they will be for years to come. Why, this year we have the greatest, most fearless, death-defying and gargantuan—"

He interrupted himself a moment later to explain that never within his memory (eight months short of an elephant's) had any other circus had the effrontery to set up shop in New York City in the spring.

"And when they see that breathtaking, bewildering battalion of belching behemoths from darkest Africa—"

Mr. Fellows knew all about his bellowing behemoths, but he didn't know when Ringling Brothers would open at Madison Square Garden. A secret, he said.

STREET REPAIR WORK TO START MARCH 15

The Street Department Maintenance Division is to operate with a full force beginning March 15 for the first time since early last fall, City Engineer Henry Steeg said today.
