

## HOOSIER FARM BUREAU TO ADD LIFE INSURANCE

Offices of New Company To Be Located Here, Schenck Says.

The Indiana Farm Bureau today announced that it is sponsoring formation of a new life insurance company, to be known as the Hoosier Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co.

Offices are to be in the Farm Bureau Building here, according to President Hassil E. Schenck. "Starting in a small way two years ago, the Farm Bureau automobile insurance has progressed to become a very prominent and sound insurance company, operated by and for farmers," Mr. Schenck said. "While the life insurance will not be restricted to farm people, it is the desire of the directors of the new company that the majority of insurance be written among farm people."

### Capital Oversubscribed

"The amount of capital required by State insurance laws has been greatly oversubscribed, and it is the intention of the directors not to start the new company until sufficient pledges for insurance are on file to insure the safe and secure operation of the company. The directors will not be satisfied to start the company with only the number of policies required by the State insurance laws."

"By using the same agency force that now is caring for the automobile insurance, the work will be expedited," continued Mr. Schenck. "This places the new company in a better condition than were it necessary to go out and build an entirely new agency force. Agents are located in practically every county of the state."

"While this is a new venture on part of the Indiana Farm Bureau leadership, there are seven other states now operating insurance companies successfully. This move on the part of Indiana farm leaders was brought about by the constant urge of farmers for a mutual company in which they could carry their own insurance on a reasonable basis."

"It is anticipated that sufficient pledges will be signed in the next few weeks to bring about the issuance of the charter for the new company."

## 'Y' EXECUTIVE NOTES PROGRESS IN CHINA

Lyman Hoover Reports Unity Effected by Chiang.

China has progressed in public works and national strength, Lyman Hoover, former city resident and now on the staff of the Y. M. C. A. in China, said today upon his return from the Orient.

"Under the leadership of Gen. Chiang Kai-shek a unity is being approached by China. The general has risen above the narrow course which some militarists have followed after a rise to power," he said.

Mr. Hoover is a graduate of Butler University and Shortridge High School. He is one of three Y. M. C. A. workers supported by the Indianapolis "Y" in the Orient.

## REPORTS SLASH IN SCHOOL CITY PROPERTY TAX

A. B. Good Tells Board Further Decrease May Be Possible.

A. B. Good, City School Business Director, today forecast continued decrease in the amount of property taxes necessary for upkeep of the schools.

In a financial statement for 1935-1936, filed last night at a meeting of the School Board, he said property taxes for support of the School City had decreased from \$6,708,829 in 1931-1932 to \$4,666,030 last year. Mr. Good said the recent Teachers' Payment Law, which boosts state aid to \$700 a teaching unit, would increase the Indianapolis revenue \$432,000 over the 1935-1936 school year.

### Other Revenues Listed

The increased state aid is expected to take up the decreases in property tax revenues, he said.

The operating revenues of the School City totalled \$5,943,683.21 in 1935-1936, a decrease of \$1,185,214 since 1931-1932.

Among the miscellaneous revenues shown in Mr. Good's financial report were: Book and

Bonded indebtedness now \$10,048,000 will be decreased an additional \$200,000 by July 1, the business director declared. The indebtedness was \$12,124,000 in 1935. The School Board approved the issuance of \$100,000 in bonds for improvements at Schools 35 and 47. Luther L. Dickerson, librarian, said the training course for librarians will be reopened next fall. The course was abandoned in 1932.

Corcoran, who once served a prison sentence for complicity in a blackmail scheme, Rupert W. Masters, 37, and Edward A. Goggin, 42, were charged with transporting a \$10,000 U. S. Treasury bond stolen from the Fidelity & Columbia Trust Co., Louisville, Ky., Sept. 25, 1935.

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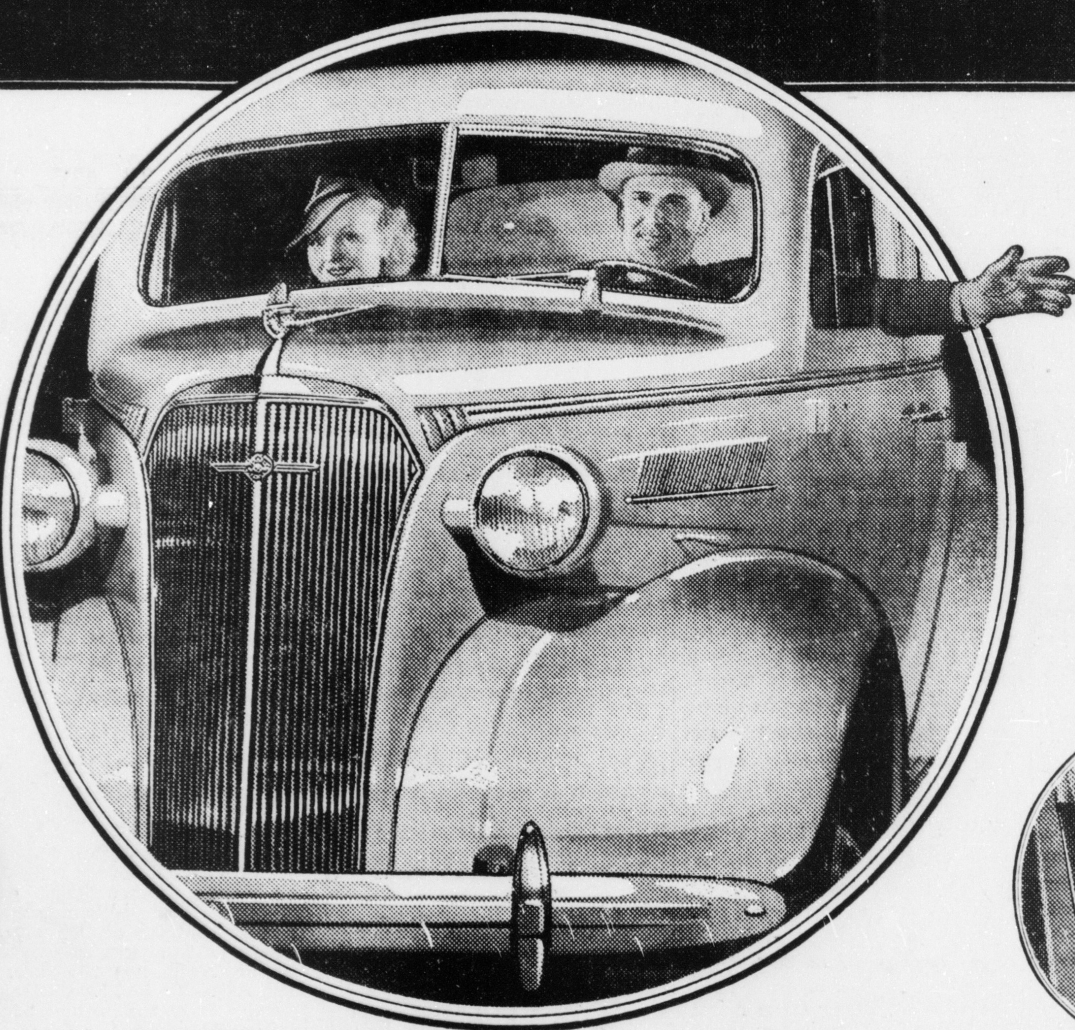
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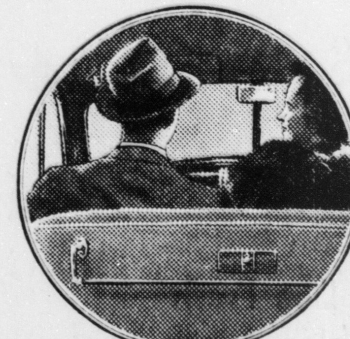
