Was Widow of Furniture Firm Head; Services to Be Held Tomorrow.

Mrs. Ida Kahn, 3525 N. Pennsylvania St., who died yesterday in St. Vincent's Hospital after a short illness, is to be buried tomorrow in the Hebrew Congregation Cemetery. She was 52.

Mrs. Kahn was the widow of Nathan Kahn, former National Furniture Co. president. She was widely known in Indianapolis social and philanthropic circles. She was active in the Hebrew Congregation here, was a former president of the Indianapolis Council of Jewish Women, and was a member of the Temple Sisterhood.

Born in Columbus, Miss., she came to Indianapolis 25 years ago following her marriage to Mr. Kahn. Funeral services are to be held at 1 p. m. tomorrow in the Flanner & Buchanan Mortuary. Survivors are a son, Roger A. Kahn; a sister, Mrs. Samuel Messing; a brother, Norman B. Silberberg, and her father, all of Indianapolis, and a brother, Arthur Silberberg, Hollywood, Cal.
