

## BANDITS SLUG TRUCK DRIVER, FLEE WITH \$90

Deputy Sheriffs and Police  
Hunt Pair Who Forced  
Way Into Car.

Deputy Sheriff and City police today were seeking two bandits who slugged and robbed Jack Pape, 1604 E. 10th St., and escaped with \$90.

Mr. Pape told deputies that the men forced their way into his truck at 38th St. and Franklin Road. One of them struck him on the head while the other took his money, he said. They then threw away the keys to his truck and fled, he said. Clyde Reynolds, 25, of 2454 Boulevard Place, was charged with drawing a deadly weapon and trespassing by a merchant policeman who said he threatened a Union Station baggage room employee last night.

"The cat jumped down and ran through the bars of the cage, under the seats and disappeared. Emmet dropped his chair and gun and started chasing it. He bumped into the cage. He got so excited he couldn't find the door of the cage and had to climb up and over.

"This went over with every one but the cat, who developed a chronic fright of Emmet. It became a major job to catch the cat every night before the show. The minute the cat saw Emmet coming it would bolt anyway it could.

"We couldn't understand this because Emmet never hurt the cat. Emmet thought the cat was self-conscious because of the crowds." Mr. Parks then happened to see the Old Woman in a Shoe float used for parade purposes.

"Funny thing," he said, "the old man that sits in that during the parade, dressed, of course, like an old woman, has been doing that stunt in this and other circuses for years. He doesn't do anything else much. Seems, Mr. Parks permitted himself a tiny, size double-o smirk here that he just makes a good old woman in the shoe."

"But why," someone asked Mr. Parks, "has Emmet completely abandoned the cat act if it seemed to get over so well in Chicago and was so sure fire?"

Mr. Parks looked a little startled and as though he didn't know how to deal with this remarkable memory for details.

"Oh, I don't know," he said, "I guess he just can't find another cat."

## RUSH SURGEON TO MAKE TALK

I. U. Postgraduate Course  
Students to Meet in  
Lincoln.

Dr. Vernon C. David, Rush Medical College, Chicago, surgery professor, is to be the principal speaker before the Indiana University postgraduate course students at a meeting tonight in the Hotel Lincoln.

Over 300 have registered for the course. Clinics were held this morning in cardiovascular-renal diseases, surgery, gynecology, medicine and otolaryngology. Intravenous therapy also was discussed.

A clinical conference was scheduled for this afternoon. Prof. Maude Slye, cancer authority from the University of Chicago, is to address a public meeting Friday evening at Caleb Mills Hall, Shortridge High School, it was announced.

A new method of giving children cod liver oil was proposed at yesterday's meeting by Dr. R. N. Harger, I. U. medical center. He said a way had been found to feed cows irradiated yeast to provide the same vitamins as cod liver oil furnishes.

Dr. Harger also discounted the value of taking vitamins by massaging them in sausage, ice cream, cold cream, and chewing gum. "Milk and bread are the only two foods which the Committee on Foods, American Medical Association, has approved for the adding of Vitamin D," he said.

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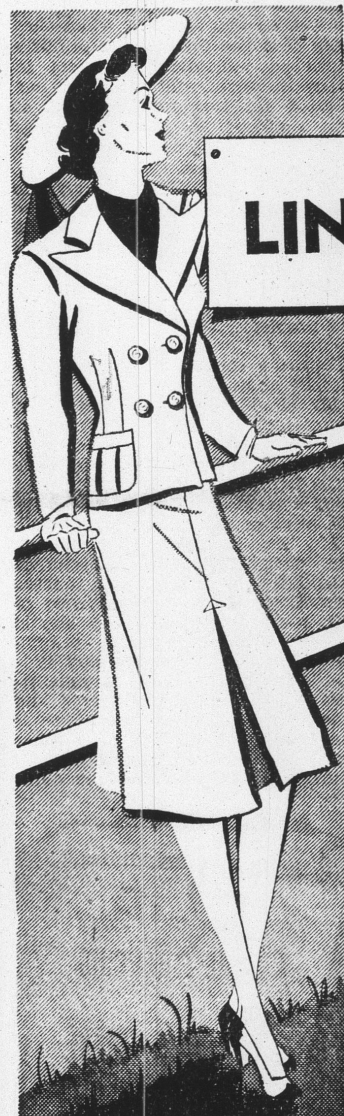
