## Hoosiers Are Victims

Other victims have been identified as Alfred Causey, Hammond, Ind.; Kenneth Reed and Earl Handley, both of Indiana Harbor, Ind.; Joseph Rothmund, Chicago, and Sam Popovich, address unknown.

At Saginaw, Mich., the Chevrolet Service Parts plant, a General Motors unit employing 500 men, was closed today when the management shut off the electric power supply after union workers had ejected five nonunion employees. Immediately after operations were halted, the workers barricaded themselves inside the plant gates and announced they would remain until they were granted a closed shop.

## Never Saw Lewis

In Cleveland Tom Girdler, Republic chairman, said he had never met John L. Lewis, C. I. O. head, "and I hope to God I never see him."

Meanwhile the strike of thousands of steel workers had reduced Republic production by half, and had completely shut down plants of two other large independent producers—Inland Steel Corp. and Youngstown Sheet & Tube.

A Republic plane crashed today during alleged sniping at food deliveries to nonstriking workers at Warren, O., while the Federal Government moved for peace quietly behind the restive steel strike scene.

The plane had flown low over the plant shortly before and had been a target for rocks and bolts thrown by pickets.

In Detroit a subpoena was issued today for Edsel Ford as a one-man grand jury investigated circumstances of a fight at the Ford River Rouge plant last week between company employees and organizers for the United Automobile Workers of America.

Wayne County Prosecutor Duncan C. McCrea, who ordered the grand jury investigation of the near-riot last Wednesday, disclosed that Ford would be sought as a witness before Common Pleas Judge Ralph M. Liddy.

## Rand Will Ask

The National Labor Relations Board in Washington today asked the Second Circuit Court of Appeals to issue a temporary injunction restraining Remington-Rand, Inc., from alleged unfair labor practices.

There were two bright spots on the labor horizon:

In Hollywood, a month-old strike of motion picture technicians was believed nearing an end.

In Gillespie, Ill., it was announced that 550 miners, who staged an eight-day sit-down strike at the bottom of the Superior Coal Co. mine at Wilsonville, will return to work pending negotiation of their demands.

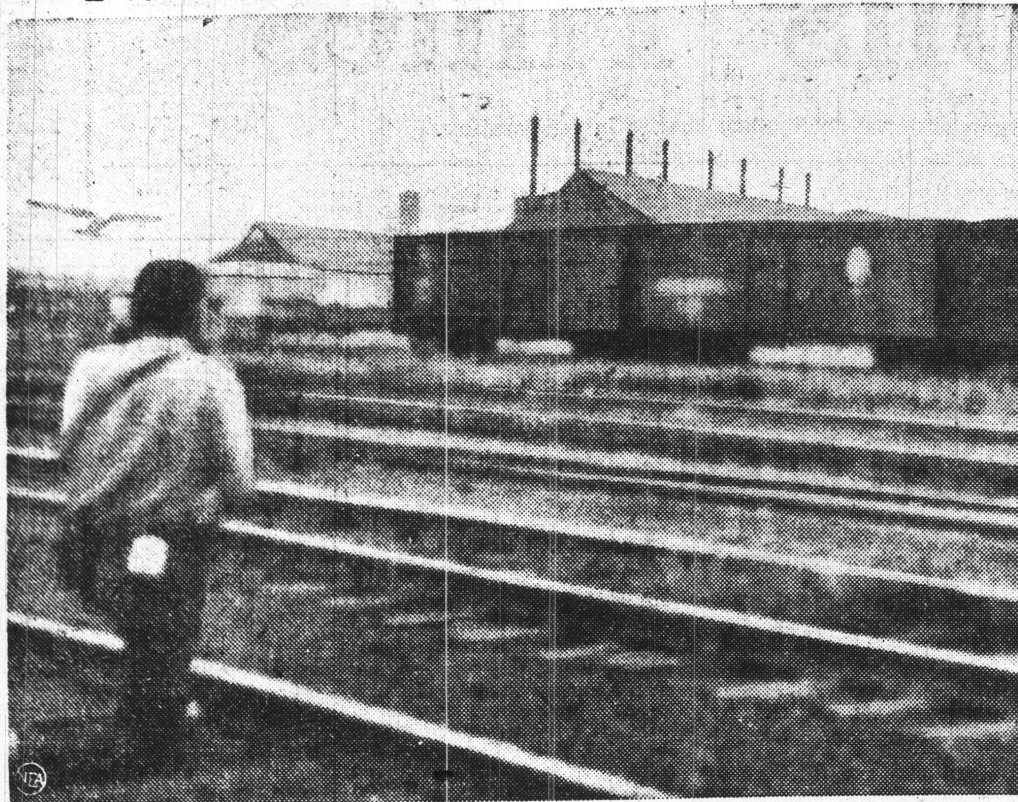
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# Plane Delivers Food to Workers

## FILES SUIT TO BAN PHONE BOOK ADS

A suit asking a court order to prevent the Indiana Bell Telephone Co. from selling advertising in its directory, was on file in Superior Court 2 today.

Paul B. Keller, of the Keller Brothers Transfer Co., brought the suit. He charged that the Telephone company discriminated against the Keller company as to position of its advertisement and as to terms of payment.

Mr. Keller, in asking the injunction, charged that "advertising is not set out in the defendant's articles of incorporation as part of the operation of the telephone system," and that advertising rates "are exorbitant."

Telephone company officials declined to comment.
