child died while being removed to a hospital.

Five-year-old Donald Francis Conlin, 816 Coffey St., died Tuesday morning of skull fracture suffered when an automobile struck him near his home.

Three in Hospitals

Three other children, the oldest 13, remain in critical condition in local hospitals. Several others have been treated by physicians during the last week.

Mrs. Florence Simmons Davis, 36, of 1416 S. Keystone Ave., was arrested as the driver of the automobile which killed Barbara Condit, seriously injured her parents and Miss Ruby Minnix 18, of 741 N. East St., who was holding the baby, and cut and bruised her sister and brother, Betty Lou, 8, and Ralph, 6.

Mrs. Davis' case was continued until June 18 by Municipal Judge Charles Karabell on request of the State today pending completion of the investigation. Judge Karabell set Mrs. Davis' bonds at \$2500 on a manslaughter charge; \$1500 on a charge of failure to stop after an accident; \$1000 on a charge of operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor; \$100 for driving through a safety zone, and \$1 for drunkenness, a total of \$5101.

Mrs. Davis, mother, Mrs. Margaret Bewley, 1417 St. Peter St., held on a vagrancy charge, was released on \$500 bond.

According to police record, Mrs. Simmons is alleged to have shot her husband, James Simmons, a city fireman, on Dec. 28, 1921. She pleaded self-defense and was acquitted July 20, 1922.

Witnesses told police that the Condit family and Miss Minnix were standing in the safety zone at Virginia Ave. and Noble St. when a car going southeast on Virginia Ave. drove into the zone and "hurled the people in all directions."

Mother, Father Injured

Mrs. Sally Sinker, 1527 S. Alabama St., said she picked up the baby from the middle of the street and carried it to a physician's office. The child died before Mrs. Sinker reached her destination, it was reported.

Harold Condit, 33, of 1294 Pinley Ave., the child's father, was taken to City Hospital with a double fracture of the left leg and a broken left elbow.

Mrs. Sarah Condit, 26, her mother, received a possible brain concussion, according to City Hospital physicians.

Miss Minnix was taken to the hospital with a fractured left leg, cuts and bruises.

Betty Lou and Ralph were treated for severe lacerations and released.

Police later arrested Mrs. Davis, who they charged was the car driver. They said she was under the influence of liquor. Dr. R. N. Harger, toxicologist, made two tests to determine the degree of intoxication. Results of the tests were not revealed.

The child was injured fatally an hour earlier when struck by an automobile driven by Ernest Mills, 28, of 2102 Gent Ave. He was taken to City Hospital by Mr. Mills and died of a fractured skull and compound fractures of both legs.

Witnesses told police that the accident was unavoidable. Mr. Mills was ordered held under \$500 bond pending a coroner's investigation.

LIFE IS SERENE AT NORTH POLE CAMP

MOSCOW, June 4.—Russian explorers camped at the North Pole report by radio that life is proceeding pleasantly in their tent city with the temperature hovering in the neighborhood of freezing.

The messages describe the comfortable if tiny settlement established on the shifting ice floes of the Arctic. Twelve pink, white and green tents have been set up with a black one in the center. Narrow "streets" separate the tents, each of which has a low ice fence around it to serve as a windbreak.

For relaxation the men play chess and scribble in their diaries. The messages reported a shortage of books. News from the outside world comes in frequently by radio. As a concession to civilization, the men shave daily.

STATE REJECTS SALARY RAISES AT POOR FARM

Tax Board Approves All
Other Fund Requests
Of County.

The State Tax Board today approved all but \$180.49 of additional appropriations amounting to \$29,474 in a hearing on requests from county officials.

In denying the \$180.49, which was itemized as salary increases for personnel at the Marion County Poor Farm, Board members explained that this amount exceeded the 1937 budget.

William Book, Chamber of Commerce executive vice president and County officials discussed the additional appropriations.

The Chamber of Commerce yesterday protested \$779.79 of the appropriations on the ground that it would "wreck budget procedures."

County Commissioners said \$1500 of the appropriation, approved recently by the Marion County Council, was to meet higher livestock feed costs at Julietta Hospital farm.

Repair Cost Is Cited

More than \$3000, Commissioners explained, is to buy materials for repairing plumbing systems in the Courthouse and for other repairs being done by WPA workers.

An item of \$180 in the appropriation is to pay wages of an extra bookkeeper in the treasurer's office. Treasurer Frank McKinney explained the extra bookkeeper was necessary to handle work incident to the new Tax Moratorium Law passed by the 1937 Legislature.

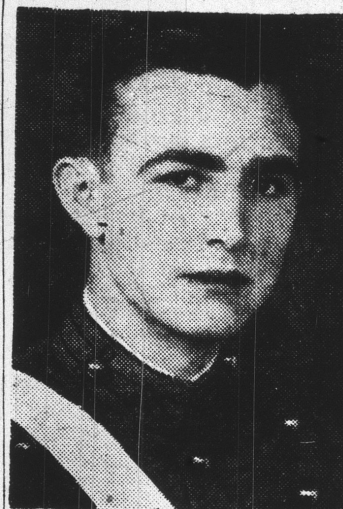
Ray E. Norman, Marion City Clerk, also is under indictment on a similar charge and is to be tried June 7.
