

# 500 INDIANA PASTORS EXPECTED HERE FOR CONFERENCE

## Meetings To Be Held Sept. 27-29

Federated Church Women on Schedule Parley At Same Time.

More than 500 Indiana pastors are expected here for the annual Indiana Pastors' Conference Sept. 27 to 29, inclusive.

Sessions are to be held in the First Baptist Church, Meridian and Vermont sts. The Federated Church Women are to hold their meeting at the same time. Their sessions are to be held in the Second Presbyterian Church, Vermont and N. Pennsylvania sts.

The meetings are to feature sermons and study periods.

Many church leaders are expected to attend and have been assigned parts on the program, according to the Rev. C. A. McPheeters, vice president of the Church Federation of Indianapolis, speaking in the absence of Dr. Ernest N. Evans, executive secretary.

Among those scheduled on the program are Dr. Edgar De Witt Jones, Federated Council of Churches of Christ in America, president; Mrs. Edna Fuller, member of the Florida State Senate, and Bishop Robert E. Jones, Negro bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Columbus. The Rev. Charles B. Swartz, Bloomington, is conference president.

## Social Move Wins Praise

Methodist Ministers Lauded For Pension Plan.

**BATTLE GROUND**, Ind., June 19.—Ministers of the church are "courageously shaping the social action of their communities," Governor Townsend today had told the Northwest Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

In his address last night he congratulated the conference and Methodist Church for setting up an old-age "social security program" for its ministers and their widows, adding: "If there were more organizations which felt social obligations as keenly as the Methodist Church, our society would be more orderly and stable than it is today."

"Loud-mouthed dictators," the Governor said, "who attempt to shout down the church by vile epithets will soon discover that the right to worship a God of your own choosing is as fundamental as the right to a living wage, security in old age and employment, a family and adequate housing."

The conference rejected an invitation from South Bend to have its 1938 session there, preferring to remain at Battle Ground.

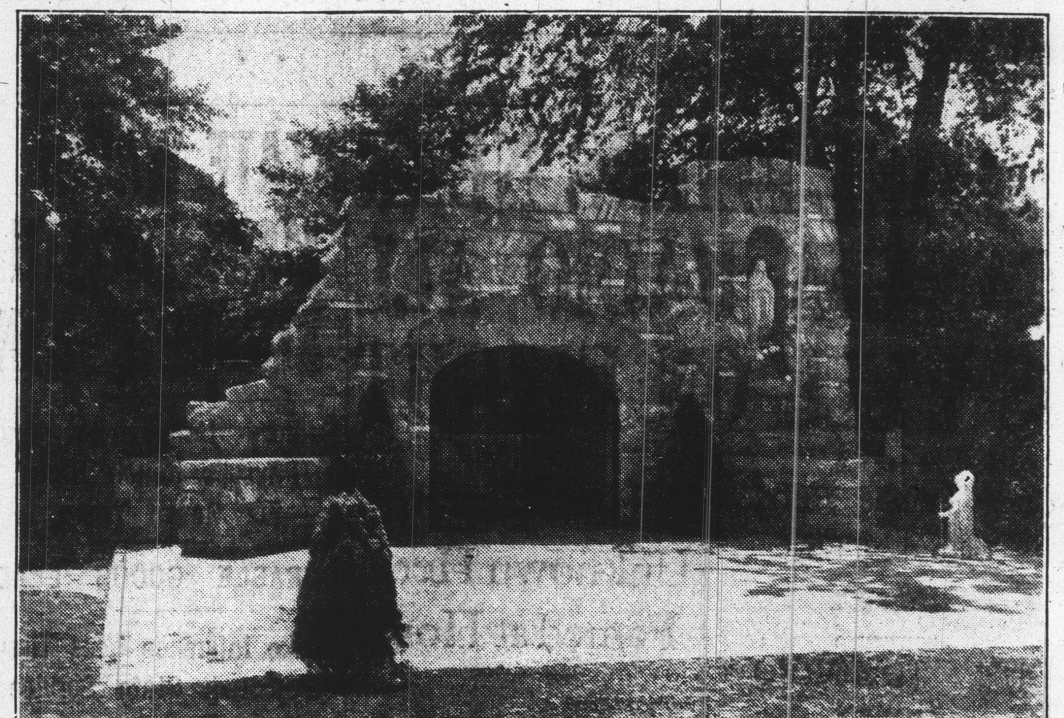

## Joseph's Kindness to Kin

THE story of Joseph reaches a further stage, and a beginning of tragedy in years to come that neither the old patriarch, Jacob, nor his successful and powerful son in Egypt, could foresee.

How closely science and tragedy are associated in history and in the lives of individuals and families. Here was Jacob, going down in his old age, carried by his sons with their little ones and their wives in the wagons which Pharaoh had sent, to a great welcome and pre-ferment in Egypt, under the influence and power of the flourishing Joseph, a power in the land even greater than Pharaoh's master.

There is a great pageant in the picture of Joseph making ready his chariot and going up to Goshen to meet his father; and nothing could surpass the simple words of the story that describe the meeting as Joseph, presenting himself to his father, "fell on his neck, and wept on his face, he said, 'I have seen thy face, that thou art yet alive.'"

Joseph himself was experiencing emotion too deep for utterance. All that he could say to Joseph was, "Now let me die, since I have seen thy face, that thou art yet alive."

THE story of Joseph ends with this lesson, but it is necessary to see that story not in any one detail or incident, but as a whole. Few stories provide better teachings concerning the effects of evil, the rewards of righteousness, the value of vision and planning, and the strength and power of forgiveness and magnanimity.

It is rich in human values, and its teachings apply to our modern complex world as much as to an ancient time when the sufferings of people from famine and the power of kings and potentates were more marked in human history.

Joseph was an example of what wise leadership can do in successful social planning. He looked ahead to the needs of the people and stored up resources for emergencies.

In an age when crises can be foreseen more accurately than in the ancient world, and when resources and ways of harboring them are greatly multiplied, what might be accomplished by statesmen as honest, unselfish, magnanimous and foreseeing as Joseph!

Completed plans call for special emphasis on training leaders in adult education. The program is to be carried on in co-operation with the committee on Christian education with the Rev. C. A. Metz, Lebanon, as chairman.

The program committee is headed by Allyn K. Wolfe, Tuxedo Park, N. Y., superintendent of the Baptist Sunday School superintendents. Other members are I. W. Mills, Central Baptist School, and Charles W. Rankin, Exeter Avenue School.

Baptist superintendents are to present a social program for Sunday School workers at the Leaning Tower Baptist Church, Sept. 15. They will assist in the Laymen's Emergency Evangelistic Committee work.

Earl B. Teckemeyer, a member, is to deliver the address tomorrow at All Souls Unitarian Church in the absence of Dr. F. S. C. Wicks, pastor. The speaker is a member of the Laymen's League and a student of ministry.
