

500 INDIANA PASTORS EXPECTED HERE FOR CONFERENCE

Meetings To Be Held Sept. 27-29

Federated Church Women Schedule Parley At Same Time.

More than 500 Indiana pastors are expected here for the annual Indiana Pastors' Conference Sept. 27 to 29, inclusive.

Sessions are to be held in the First Baptist Church, Meridian and Vermont Sts. The Federated Church Women are to hold their meeting at the same time. Their sessions are to be held in the Second Presbyterian Church, Vermont and N. Pennsylvania Sts.

The meetings are to feature sermons and study periods.

Many church leaders are expected to attend and have been assigned parts on the program, according to the Rev. C. A. McPheeters, vice president of the Church Federation of Indianapolis, speaking in the absence of Dr. Ernest N. Evans, executive secretary.

Among those scheduled on the program are Dr. Edgar De Witt Mrs. Federated Council of Churches of Christ in America president; Mrs. Edna Fuller, member of the Florida State Senate, and Bishop Robert E. Jones, Negro bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Columbus. The Rev. Charles B. Swartz, Bloomington, is conference president.

Summer Union Services Indorsed by Federation

New emphasis on interdenominational co-operation and summer evening union services suggested by the Federal Church Council, have been indorsed by the Indianapolis Church Federation.

Joint meetings on Sunday evenings, to be held in public parks if possible, should start on June 27 and continue through the summer, the Federation public relations committee has suggested. They would continue until Sept. 4.

"Few churches have satisfactory evening services during the summer months," the Federal Council contends. "The committee on Sabbath schools is to make the suggestion that the churches unite in common community worship."

"There is manifest need in the churches of a new spirit of united adventure for the Kingdom of God," the national organization's message declares.

In his address last night he congratulated the conference and Methodist Church for setting up an old-age social security program for its ministers and their widows, adding: "If there were more organizations which felt social obligations as keen as the Methodist Church, our society would be more orderly and stable than it is today."

"Loud-mouthed dictators," the Governor said, "who attempt to shut down the church by vile epithets will soon discover that the right to worship a God of your own choosing is as fundamental as the right to a living wage, security in old age and employment, a family and adequate housing."

The conference rejected an invitation from South Bend to have its 1938 session there, preferring to remain at Battle Ground.

In the vacation Bible school, they spent the first half hour, from 9:30 a. m. to 10:15 p. m., in the classroom, working and singing, and the next hour in Bible handwork. Indianapolis church women served them luncheon of milk, sandwiches and cookies.

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
