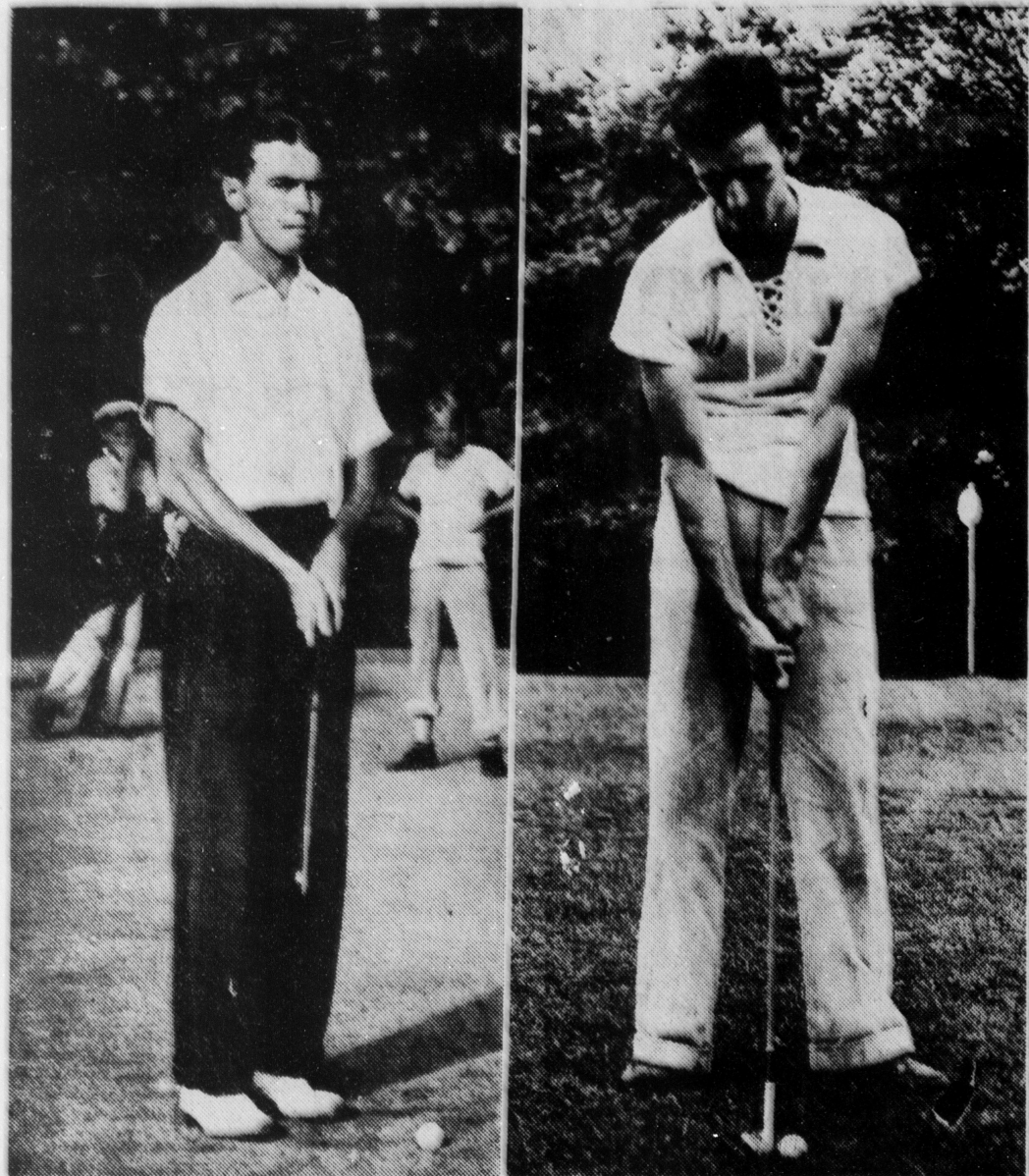


# 5 NAMED TO REPRESENT CITY IN PUBLIC LINKS PLAY

## William Walsh Paces Field; Rain Handicap to Players

South Grove Linksman Shoots 149; Jordan, Bray, Oliver And Yohler Land Places.

Five young Indianapolis golfers looked forward today to a trip to the West Coast where they will represent the city in the annual Public Links championships in San Francisco, Aug. 9 to 14.

This was to be their reward for victories yesterday in the qualifying round of the local tournament held over the Coffin course.

William Walsh of South Grove paced the field over the 36 holes with a neat 149. Two strokes behind him came Ralph Jordan of Riverside and Bernard Bray of Coffin, tied with 151. Fourth place on the team went to Leonard Oliver, Sarah Shank, who fired a 154.

The alternate position was won by a former Muncie High School champion, lanky Bob Yohler, now of Pleasant Run, with a 157. He defeated Fred Gronauer, Pleasant Run, by one stroke. Gronauer also lost last year by one stroke.

**Rain Mars Play**  
It rained during the early matches in the morning and destroyed all chances of breaking par. Again in the afternoon while all the players were out the clouds let loose, and all were soaked.

The boys who landed positions on the team won with strokes to spare. Walsh was forced to go five strokes over par on the last three holes to score a 72 in the afternoon while his 77 during the morning was good enough to win medal honors.

After taking five on the 16 and 17 holes, Walsh still had a chance to break par on the final green with a par three but luck was against him. His tee shot landed in a trap northeast of the green, and it took two shots to dig it out and land on the green.

Regardless of this, he was still 10 strokes better than the rest of the foursome. Weber and Nichols shot 159s and Charles Owens withdrew after firing a couple into the creek on the 18th hole.

## Jack Curley Dead at 61

Promoter Credited With Saving Wrestling.

NEW YORK, July 12.—Jack Curley, 61, who promoted everything from flea circuses and one-piece bathing suits to heavyweight wrestling, died of a heart attack today at his Great Neck, L. I., home.

Curley did what most sports experts had believed was impossible. He restored wrestling to public favor after it had been denounced as the most crooked of all off-color racketeering. Under Curley's touch, wrestling flourished after 1929, and thousands paid to watch his exhibitions throughout the country.

The genial promoter, who stepped out of the field of sports on several occasions to promote a Wild West circus, to manage a tour of the Vatican choir and to promote dance marathons and bridge contests, was born in San Francisco July 4, 1876, of Alsatian parents. He was christened Jacques Armand Schuel, but later changed that to Curley, a nickname that had been given him because of his thick ringlets.

It was in 1929 that Curley entered the wrestling field, and a few years later his wrestlers became known as "the grunt and groan men." He dramatized the matches by having the wrestlers simulate "pain" by shrieking and screaming as they worked. The public liked it.

Curley lived for many years in the house in which he died suddenly this morning. His butler was a retired pugilist and his home the mecca of sports celebrities. Funeral services have not yet been arranged.

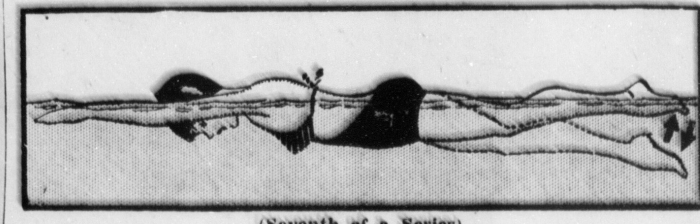
In the senior division Bob Grady scored 32 points; Bob Poulson, 27; Bert Smith, 15, and Carl Stedman, 10.

## Get in the Swim—Novices Advised to Have Critics Observe Practice



(Seventh of a Series)

If you have practiced what I have been preaching in the preceding articles you have done much toward developing your stroke and muscles.

It has been previously mentioned that the only way to acquire physical skill is through repeated practice. This means work.

But it is most advisable to have some one watch you and point out your mistakes.

And also don't overdo yourself. Don't only practice swimming, but practice moderation. It is possible to practice too much on land and slip into a faulty stroke.

Practice the flutter-kick by holding on to the edge of the pool or with your hands resting on the bottom of the pool.

Kick downward with right leg; left leg rising slightly. Kick downward with left leg; right leg rising slightly. Repeat these two movements until tired.

Rest, then walk out to water chest deep. Take a deep gulp of air, bend knees slightly, spring up from the bottom, fall into floating leg position, and start executing the flutter kick.

Next: Hand crawl.

## Sets Record In Half-Mile

Elroy Robinson Steals Show In New York

NEW YORK, July 12.—A cracked ankle shattered Elroy Robinson's dream of a place on Uncle Sam's Olympic team last year, but the stocky Merced, Cal., school teacher had his reward today in a new half-mile world record.

Robinson, national half-mile champion when he graduated from Fresno State College in 1935, stole the show from 20 of the nation's track and field stars at the second annual World Labor Athletic Carnival yesterday when he clipped two-tenths of a second off the 800-yard mark set in 1934, by a fellow member of San Francisco's Olympic Club, "Blazin' Ben Eastman."

Robinson's achievement immediately began a discussion as to what would have happened had Johnny Woodruff, the lanky Pitt Negro, been in the race. Woodruff, Olympic 800-meter champion and

San Romani set the pace until the final turn, when Cunningham blazed out to win by four yards in 4:11.4. Gene Venzke, the Pottstown, Pa., flash, running under the colors of the New York A. C., was third, and Woodruff fourth, 40 yards behind Cunningham.
