

J. J. MOSSLER FUNERAL IS SET FOR TOMORROW

Widely Known Insurance
Broker Dies in Home
At Age of 63.

Jesse J. Mossler, 129 Hampton Drive, widely known Indianapolis insurance broker, who died yesterday in his home, will be buried in the Hebrew Congregation cemetery following services at 10:30 a. m. tomorrow in the Hebrew Congregation Temple.

He was 63 years old. Mr. Mossler was born in Indianapolis and had spent the major part of his life here. He was associated with Indianapolis charitable and philanthropic work for many years and had served as a member of the board of directors and as a trustee of the Hebrew Congregation.

For the last 25 years he had been secretary-treasurer of the Indianapolis Golf Association.

Physician Had Practiced in
Shelbyville 50 Years.

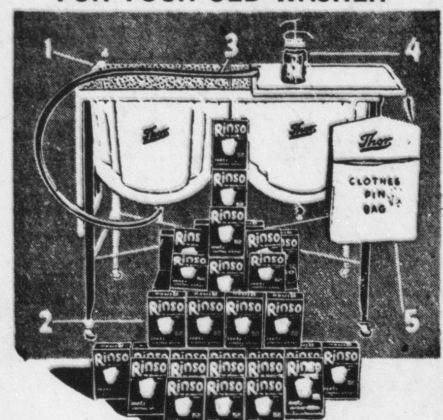
