George E. Hershman, Crown Point, past grand sire of the Sovereign Lodge, I. O. O. F., spoke on advantages of fraternalism at a preconvention banquet attended by 500 in the Hotel Lincoln last night. He cited the work of fraternal orders as a contributive factor to international understanding. Other speakers were Miss Anna Belle Gaynor, Indianapolis, state president, and Mrs. Cecelia Monical, Washington, vice president.

At the hall tonight in Tomlinson Hall, degrees are to be conferred by the Olive Branch, Theta, Epsilon Girls' Club 6, and the Olive Branch Rebekah Lodge 10. Miss Martha Foltz, Indianapolis, will be in charge of the first ceremony, and Mrs. Stephen O. Sharp, Indianapolis, will supervise conferring of the Rebekah degree.

BOY, 13, HELD AFTER ATTACK ON WATCHMAN

Youth Confesses Slugging in
Attempted Holdup,
Police Report.

A 13-year-old boy was held in the Juvenile Detention Home today after police said he admitted slugging a watchman in an attempted holdup yesterday.

According to police, the youth confessed he saw Robertus Rutherford, 24, of 1544 S. Concord St., watchman, in the Indiana Terminal Warehouse offices as he wandered about the streets. He said he entered and struck the watchman twice with a wrench.

A few minutes later, according to police, Mr. Rutherford found the boy hiding behind a wall. Mr. Rutherford was treated at City Hospital for scalp wounds.
