

HOWARD FLAYS A. F. OF L. VOTE TO OUST C. I. O.

'Complete Desperation' Is Shown in Grant of Power To Council.

DENVER, Oct. 12 (U. P.).—The American Federation of Labor today opened an attack on the National Labor Relations Board by demanding that Congress compel recognition of federation craft unions in their warfare against the rebel Committee for Industrial Organization.

DENVER — Charles P. Howard of Indianapolis criticizes A. F. of L. vote permitting executive council to oust C. I. O. unions.

ATLANTIC CITY—C. I. O. war conference hears reports on text and newspaper organization drives.

DENVER, Oct. 12 (U. P.).—Charles P. Howard, Indianapolis, International Typographical Union president, charged today that the American Federation of Labor was acting "with complete desperation" in its war against the rival Committee for Industrial Organization.

Mr. Howard, who is C. I. O. secretary, assailed the A. F. of L. convention for voting the executive council power to expel the ten rebel unions and for attempting to destroy the possibility of political or governmental support for John L. Lewis.

"So far as the action of the federation is concerned in regard to the C. I. O., it will make no difference whatever in our program," Mr. Howard said.

"The C. I. O. will continue its organizing campaign. It is meeting with greater success every day because it is raising wages and that is more effective than the A. F. of L. wind-blowing."

"The sentiment of the rank and file of workers in this country was indicated by the fact that the delegates to the A. F. of L. convention who are closest to the people refused to vote on the expulsion issue."

"It seems to me that the attitude of the federation officers is dictated by desperation. President William Green is so desperate that even his best friends cannot understand what he means."

Mr. Howard said that Mr. Green's offer for the rank and file rebel unions to return to the A. F. of L. would not be accepted by a single man because they knew that the A. F. of L. unions would wreck them in jurisdictional fights if they returned under such circumstances.

Mr. Howard criticized the federation's challenge for political leaders to declare themselves in regard to the labor war on the grounds that such action was unethical for a trade union.

C. I. O. Hears Reports On Union Drives

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 12 (U. P.).—Sidney Hillman, the Textile Organizing Committee chairman, a C. I. O. affiliate, reported today that his group unionized one-third of the nation's 1,300,000 textile employees in a six-month drive that cost \$970,000.

The C. I. O. delegates opened the second day of their war council without comment on the threatened expulsion action taken by the A. F. of L. last night in Denver. Their private expressions indicated a complete indifference toward the federation. John L. Lewis, C. I. O. head, reserved comment.

President Heywood Brown of the American Newspaper Guild reported that his organization figures show a membership of 13,328 in 93 locals. This figure, he said, includes 880 members in other than the editorial departments of newspapers and may reach as high as 15,000 when latest reports are compiled.

Mr. Brown said the A. N. G. has "tapped off upwards of 10 million unpaid-for hours of work a year for American newspaper men" and increased wages in "the aggregate of millions."

The report accused publishers of opposing the Guild under the cry of "freedom of the press" and charged that President William Green of the American Federation of Labor is co-operating with publishers in resistance to the Guild. Mr. Brown said that the gathering of newspaper publishers in Chicago, Ill., on June 29 was called to discuss freedom of the press, but he charged that it actually was held to plan "a general attack on the Guild."

Two guilds, one in Tyler, Tex., and the other in Enid, Okla., recently surrendered their charters because of opposition to the C. I. O., the report stated. Mr. Brown said the finances of the organization are being seriously drained by strikes in Seattle, Wash., and Brooklyn, N. Y. "In spite of these obstacles," the report said, "the guild is growing and there is every evidence that its C. I. O. affiliation and policy have a tremendous appeal to the great bulk of those still unorganized in the newspaper industry."

SEX EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS ATTACKED

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 12 (U. P.).—Advocates of sex education in public schools were condemned today as "uneducated educators" and radical movements among the nation's youth were denounced by speakers at the third annual National Catechetical Congress.

Speaking last night to 8000 members of the laity attending a general meeting Rev. Vincent Mooney, C. S. C. of Washington, director of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, declared that sex education

was "fraught with danger" to the young people.

He cited three youth organizations as radical movements endangering Catholics. They were the Young Communists League, the Young Socialists League and the American Student Union.

9 SENTENCED TO DEATH

MOSCOW, Oct. 12 (U. P.).—V. M. Afanasyev, Moscow police surgeon, was sentenced to death today for murdering his wife. One person was sentenced to death in Uzbekistan and three in Khabarovsk for train wrecking, and four in Kazakhstan for counter-revolution.
