

# TIMES COOKING SCHOOL OPENS TOMORROW MORNING

## 4 Sessions to Be Held This Week at English's; Ruth Chambers in Charge

Books Containing Recipes of Dishes Demonstrated to Be Given as Part of Course; Appeal Is Both to Beginners, Experienced Housewives Alike.

The annual Indianapolis Times Cooking School will open at 9:30 a. m. tomorrow at the English Theater under the direction of Miss Ruth Chambers, widely known foods expert.

Four sessions will be held, the first three tomorrow, Thursday and Friday mornings, the last at 7:30 p. m. Friday.

The school is practical and helpful to beginners and experienced homemakers alike. The instructions and demonstrations are clear and easy to follow. Cook books containing recipes for all the dishes demonstrated are given as part of the course, so that persons attending will have all the information available to make approximately 80 dishes in their own kitchens.

"Everything done at The Times Cooking School," said Miss Chambers today, "has a definite reason. We have a plan of accomplishment in the course and the dishes are chosen to carry out this plan and help us to reach our aim."

**Purpose Is Serious**  
"The real purpose of the school is to give women authentic, worthwhile information which will help them in their homelife problems. Of course, we try to make the course an entertaining affair, to give it a party spirit, something of the glamor of a fashion show. But underneath all this is the serious purpose."

"We want the homemaker to be a better cook. We want to help her buy wisely and economically, so that she gets the most value for her food dollars, whether she has much or little to spend. We want her to be able to select her food intelligently and then to prepare it to best advantage so that it is most nutritious and appetizing."

"In planning our course, we have kept in mind that some of the women who will attend are brides and beginning homemakers. Some of them will have had home economics training. Therefore, while the course must not be too hard for the beginners, it must not be too simple to interest the more experienced cooks."

**Was Dietitian in Hospital**  
Miss Chambers is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and was dietitian in a large hospital before entering the field of food and equipment demonstration. She is a member of the staff of the National Livestock and Meat Board.

Included in the course will be meat cooking, featuring the new ways of roasting, braising and simmering; pie baking, biscuit making and many other of the arts which go toward the building of a complete meal.

Miss Chambers will be assisted by Miss Lucille Albrecht.

The entire course is free.

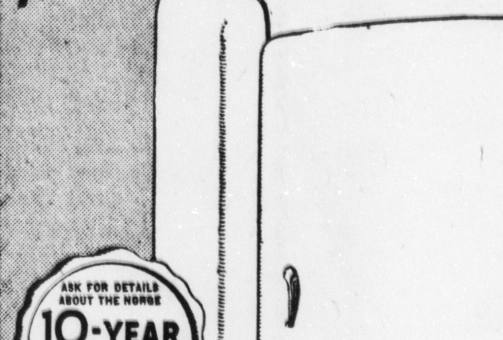
