

E. E. WERNER, PIONEER X-RAY WORKER, DEAD

Established One of First
Laboratories in City;
Moved to St. Louis.

Dr. Ernest E. Werner, formerly of Indianapolis, pioneer in X-ray work, has been buried in St. Louis following funeral services there. He was 65.

Dr. Werner, Hungarian by birth, established one of the first X-ray laboratories here. He left in 1912 to make his home in St. Louis, where he served as a consulting chemical engineer. In Indianapolis, Dr. Werner was a member of the Columbia Club and the University Club.

He was graduated from the University of Heidelberg and received his Ph.D. from Yale. Part of his X-ray work was done at the University of Pennsylvania, and he is believed to have been the last of a group of specialists who worked together 40 years ago in the development of X-ray.

Mrs. Bertha Werner, his wife, survives.

WILLIAM CURLEY, 600 Stevens St., who died yesterday in his home, is to be buried in Crown Hill Saturday following services at 9 a. m. in St. Patrick's Catholic Church. He was 80.

A native of Madison, Mr. Curley had lived in Indianapolis since childhood. He retired in 1925 after 35 years service as a mail carrier. He was a member of St. Patrick's Church.

SOUTH BEND, Oct. 14 (U. P.)—Socialized medicine "would tear down the greatest system of medical care ever developed," Dr. Edward A. Ward, Saginaw, Mich., American Osteopathic Association president said last night at the associations state convention.

"It would affect adversely America's standing as the healthiest country in the world today, by destroying the relationship between physician and patients," he said.

He advocated more intensive research in treatment of heart diseases, tuberculosis and insanity and praised the trend toward state regulation of physical examinations preliminary to marriage.
