

E. E. WERNER, PIONEER X-RAY WORKER, DEAD

Established One of First
Laboratories in City;
Moved to St. Louis.

Dr. Ernest E. Werner, formerly of Indianapolis, pioneer in X-ray work, has been buried in St. Louis following funeral services there. He was 65.

Dr. Werner, Hungarian by birth, established one of the first X-ray laboratories here. He left in 1912 to make his home in St. Louis, where he served as a consulting chemical engineer. In Indianapolis, Dr. Werner was a member of the Columbia Club and the University Club.

He was graduated from the University of Heidelberg and received his Ph.D. from Yale. Part of his X-ray work was done at the University of Pennsylvania, and he is believed to have been the last of a group of specialists who worked together 40 years ago in the development of X-ray.

Mr. Werner, his wife, survives.

WILLIAM CURLEY, 609 Stevens St., who died yesterday in his home, is to be buried in Crown Hill Saturday following services at 9 a. m. in St. Patrick's Catholic Church. He was 80.

A native of Madison, Mr. Curley had lived in Indianapolis since childhood. He retired in 1923 after 35 years service as a mail carrier. He was a member of St. Patrick's Church.


