

## Soviet Purge Will End By Nov. 7, Rumors Say; 817 Executions Listed

Only Eight Trials Now Remain on Court  
Calendar; Elections Dec. 12 to Proceed  
Without Fear of Party 'Traitors.'

MOSCOW, Oct. 14 (U. P.)—Stalin's purge of his enemies is expected to be ended by Nov. 7, 20th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution, it was understood today.

A United Press survey listed 817 known victims, but the total is believed to be somewhat larger.

If it is found possible to end the campaign by the revolution anniversary, the country would be free of men suspected of deviating from the strict Communist Party line, and the campaign for the first election under the new Constitution could proceed without thought of "traitors." The election is to be held Dec. 12.

There was every indication that reports that the purge was ending were true.

Turkin, former Leningrad Executive Committee president, succeeds him. Of the eight trials on the court calendar, four are in Eastern Siberia, and there is one each in the Kuibishev, Tadzhikistan, Uzbekistan and Western Siberia region.

### Executions Tabulated

The United Press survey of known executions breaks down, as to charges, as follows:

National significance, counter-revolution, terrorism, espionage—52. This includes the figures of international repute.

Railroad wrecking and Japanese espionage in the Far East—41.

General sabotage—4.

Destroying or infecting grain—135.

General agricultural sabotage—68.

Industrial wrecking—28.

Railroad wrecking—9.

Poisoning workers' children—23.

Separation movements to restore capitalism—21.

Sabotage in army plants—35.

Sabotage in power plants—10.

Arson—18.

### RAIL LINES WILL GIVE SEATS TO BRAKEMEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (U. P.)—Head brakemen on freight trains were assured today of "spring cushion" seats with arm and back rests, but it may be five years before they all get one.

A. F. Whitney, Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen president, and J. J. Muller, Association of American Railroads president, jointly announced that a complaint filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission by the brakemen had been settled.

The railroad association agreed to install in the locomotive cabs, or in a sheltered cab of the tender, a seat as requested by the brakemen. The agreement applies only to locomotives used in hauling freight trains.

On the calendar as publicly announced, there remain but eight political trials, involving 62 defendants. It was possible that there might be more. But it was believed there would be few, if any, new cases. One may involve A. S. Bubnov. He was dismissed last night from his post as Commissar of Education of the Russian Republic—not the Soviet Union as a whole. D. A.
