

3 MORE BOWLING RECORDS TOPPLED

Fred Mounts Hits for 299 To Set Pace

Bowes Seal Fast Team
Cracks Three and Single
Game Marks for Year.

Three more season records had been broken today and one was equalled as bowlers continued their heavy bombardment in local league competition.

Fred Mounts by the smallest of margins missed becoming the first pinman in league activity to chalk up a perfect game when he toppled 299 pins, a new single game mark for the campaign. He rolled in the Indianapolis League at Pritchett's. The Bowes Seal Fast quintet, in the same loop, shattered two old records, the three-game with 3216 and the single contest effort with 1180.

Pie Traynor Retains Post

Moves to Strengthen Pirates By Buying Rizzo.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 14 (U. P.)—Harold (Pie) Traynor today signed a contract to manage the Pirates in 1938 and also revealed his first step in rebuilding the club.

Joining the Pirates in 1920 as a rookie third baseman, Traynor became manager of the Pittsburgh club in June, 1934.

His first deal in rebuilding the team was the purchase of outfielder John R. Rizzo, from the St. Louis Cardinals. Rizzo was obtained in exchange for catcher Tommy Padden, rookie first baseman Bernard Cook and an unannounced sum of money.

Playing for Columbus in the American Association last year, Rizzo batted .358, made 209 hits, scored 117 runs and batted in 123 runs in 150 games. He is 24, 6 feet

7 inches tall, weighs 190 pounds and his home is in Houston, Tex.
