

Pitt Is Likely To Beat Rams For a Change

Panthers Pack Wallop to Win Instead of Draw This Time, Grayson Says.

Pitt is my pick by a pair of touchdowns.

Columbia is smart, but Penn's line looks too imposing in their skirmish in New York.

Colgate has Red Chesbro at tackle and Whitey Jaeger in the backfield, but is not as weak as it was made to appear by Cornell's surge, but Tulane is my choice in Buffalo.

Cornell and its great Negro end, Holland, is likely to demoralize Syracuse at Ithaca much as they did Colgate.

Manhattan now is capable of combatting the powers, but not one with the potentialities of the current edition at Villanova. They hook up at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn.

Dartmouth Should Win

Northwestern is a slight favorite over Purdue at Evanston, but I look for Boilermakers backs to locate leaks in the center of the Purple line and at least get a draw.

I can't see how Michigan can escape taking another one on the whiskers as an angry Minnesota machine moves into Ann Arbor. Irl Tubbs can be depended upon to do a good job, but Wisconsin should get over Iowa at Madison to continue its upward climb. Illinois has enough to shade Indiana at Bloomington.

Arkansas has been tied by Texas Christian, which is closer than many expected it to be held, and the Razorbacks have another armful in Texas at Austin. Arkansas must be nominated, but the visitors will know that they've been in a row.

Favors Vanderbilt's Chances

Texas A. & M. is stronger on paper, but I wouldn't be surprised to see Texas Christian hold the Aggies even at Ft. Worth. Ray Morrison's Vanderbilt creation should repulse its coach's old school, Southern Methodist, at Dallas. Tulsa always offers something more than pink tail, but Rice is given a margin in their engagement at Houston.

Howard Harlan Jones has the required material at Southern California—enough at least to turn back Oregon in Los Angeles, Oregon State may make it close, but U. C. L. A. should still be among the leaders when it quits Corvallis. Washington State is below par, which is a poor position to be in when playing Pullman.
