

MORE PROTESTS SIGNED AGAINST WATER UTILITY

Service Line Proposal Is Attacked by Five Added Groups.

Additional protests were filed today against the Indianapolis Water Co. proposal that property owners be required to maintain and replace service lines from the curb to the utility's mains.

They were filed with the Public Service Commission by the Indianapolis Builders Association, the Civil City of Indianapolis, the Indianapolis Real Estate Board, the Builders Owners and Managers Association of Indianapolis, and O. P. Gothlin, a property owner. Previously, the Indianapolis Federation of Community and Civic Clubs had protested.

The Commission is to hold a public hearing Oct. 26 on the proposed rule and on other changes suggested by the Water Co. The utility said the proposals would "define customer relationships."

Word Definition Attacked

Some of the protests filed today attacked the company's definition of "customer" and "consumer," and some complained that the proposal would give the company jurisdiction over private property sanitary conditions.


All the protest will be considered at the Oct. 26 hearings.

At an earlier Commission hearing objectors charged that the utility wanted the replacement rule changed because the company spent large sums of money repairing pipes damaged in the sub-zero temperatures of the winter before last.

In its intervening petition, signed by Edward O. Sneathen, attorney, the federation declared the replacement rule change "will not only work hardship on the customers, but also will leave streets in bad condition after such repairs are made."

At present the water company maintains pipes from the mains to the property lines. The federal

PRISON HEADS HEAR G-MEN CRITICIZED

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (U. P.)—Austin H. McCormick, New York City Commissioner of Correction, criticized J. Edgar Hoover, chief G-Man and his "machine gun school of criminology" in an address before the American Prison Association here.

Mr. McCormick, replying to Hoover's attack on parole systems described the Hoover policy as "that school that seeks to instill into the minds of the public the idea that all offenders are mad dogs."

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INSULIN USED IN MENTAL CASES

Experiments Brought Sanity To Two of 17 Patients, Doctors Report.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (U. P.)—Experiments in use of insulin to restore sanity of dementia praecox victims were reported in the Journal of the American Medical Society today by five physicians.

The physicians described experiments on 17 men and women 13 to 42 years old.

"Two have recovered and five have shown themselves capable of being

at home for varying periods," the doctors reported. "Five showed no improvement."

Reporting physicians were Drs. Ewen Cameron and R. H. Hoskins of Worcester, Mass.; Charles A. Rymer, John D. Benjamin and Franklin E. Bough, Denver.

First improvement in insulin-treated cases was increased interest in environment, the physicians reported. Formal changes in formal behavior were observable. Several hallucinations and delusions subsided in successful cases.

Emphasis is to be placed on creation of new projects, Mr. Richey said.

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


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
