

## MOLEY CHARGES ENTIRE FOREIGN POLICY ALTERED

F. D. R. Chicago Speech Set  
New Paces for U. S.,  
He Declares.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15 (U. P.).—Raymond Moley, former "brain-truster," wrote in the magazine Newsweek today that the foreign policy suggested in President Roosevelt's Chicago speech denouncing "aggressor nations" was "fathered and partially formulated by William C. Bullitt, U. S. Ambassador to France."

Moley also said that the "Chicago doctrine" was "a far cry from the mild preachments" of Secretary of State Cordell Hull and predicted that "from now on the State Department will be put to it to reconcile the behave-or-1-may-knock-your-block-off policy with the patient-preaching policy."

He said that the "romantic touches" in the President's address were the work of Bullitt who, "these many years since he accompanied the crusading Wilson, has been dreaming of a concert of democratic powers mobilized to provide for the common defense of the status quo."

"Whatever Mr. Hull may say for his State Department in diplomatic language," Moley added, "the record shows that Mr. Roosevelt's Chicago speech announced a new foreign policy for the United States—not a modification of the policy which Mr. Hull has patiently built up."

Despite the State Department's declaration that the President's "references to international anarchists were intended for Japan alone," Moley said, the speech "obviously" was aimed at "Germany and Italy as well."

"It is barely possible, of course," he continued, "that the entire Chicago speech was merely designed to intimidate Japan, Italy and Germany."

"But," he said, "Mr. Roosevelt must know that an attempt to bluff such cruelly ambitious realists is dangerous. It stiffens the back of each war-hungry power; it raises expectations in other foreign nations which it is difficult to disappoint, and, at home, it kindles the issues of moral prestige and national honor."

Moley said the Kellogg-Briand Pact with its lack of "teeth," the Nine-Power Treaty "based on a condition contrary to fact," China's territorial and administrative integrity, and the covenant of the League of Nations, repeatedly rejected by the Senate, supplied doubtful legal backing for the President's proposal to "quarantine" aggressor nations.

"I invite the co-operation of lawyers, business people and citizens all over the country," he said. "I ask

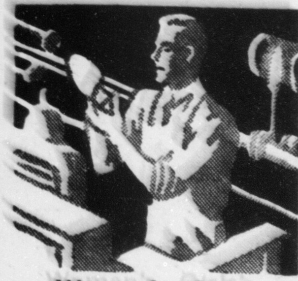
them to write and tell me which are the worst and most impractical statutes on the books and which is the first law that ought to be repealed."
