



## Hoosiers' 1910 Squad Wants Revenge for Loss to Illini

Old-Timers Invited to Join Tomorrow's Home-coming; Captain Berndt Sounds the Call.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Oct. 15.—Members of the 1910 Indiana University football team who will attend the squad reunion and dinner here tonight as a part of Indiana's home-coming celebration, remember bitterly Illinois' last visit to Bloomington, when the Illini sank Indiana's Western Conference title hopes with a last quarter field goal that gave them a 3-0 victory.

Major A. H. Berndt of Bloomington, captain and end of the 1910 Hoosier eleven, has issued a special invitation to 1910 players to be present at tonight's dinner. "I don't want the Illini to wait another 27 years before returning," the Major says.

"The last defeat still rankles and I want the last score done about it again. Illinois, I think, succeeded in kicking a field goal from a difficult angle on the 45-yard line with only a few minutes of play remaining after Indiana had been unsuccessful on two similar attempts."

The loss was the Hoosiers' only defeat that year, and gave Illinois the tie with Minnesota for the Big Ten championship.

All Indiana players before 1912 and those of 1912, 1917, 1922, 1927, and 1932 will hold reunions tonight and tomorrow. Ex-members of the Indiana band will hold their first reunion, with a special dinner following the game.

## Wildcats and Gophers Face Crucial Tests Tomorrow

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Northwestern and Minnesota—two slim favorites in the new Big Ten football campaign—will have to prove their greatness tomorrow or make way for teams who can.

Both Purdue, Northwestern's foe,

and Michigan, which meets the Golden Gophers in a battle for the little brown Jug, have dropped close Conference games but each is on the way up. Michigan, especially, is due for a boom and may get it tomorrow unless Dennis Bierman at last has fired up Minnesota.

Two home-coming games round

out the Conference schedule. Illinois plays at Indiana and Iowa goes to

Wisconsin. Chicago meets Princeton in an inter-sectional game at home. The tenth team, Ohio State, is idle.

Bierman has shifted his backs so

often this week not even the players

know who will work against Michigan.

His cry from the start of the

season was for a quarterback and it still hasn't been answered. Rudy Gmitro, a right halfback and lead-

ing gainer last year, likely will handle the quarterback assign-

ment since the Gophers looked like

their old-time powerhouse against

Indiana only when Gmitro was in

action.

Michigan will be slightly stronger with Fred Janke back in the line after a whirl at fullback. Janke will undoubtedly Don Siegel, one of the best tackles in the league, on the left side of the line while Norm Nickerson and Orman Stanton handle fullback.

Northwestern's problem is to

throttle Purdue's versatile attack.

The Wildcats never have been

strong against enemy passes and

Cecil Isbell of Purdue still is a pass-

ing threat although he lost his best

receivers, Tom Zackary and Don

Powell.

Unless Bob Zuppke has devised a

scoring play, Illinois may wind up

with another scoreless tie. Indiana

outgained Minnesota by two yards,

but the Illini proved themselves a

fine defensive team by holding

Notre Dame to only one serious

drive. The Hoosiers lost one threat

in Bill Anderson, a halfback, who

helps Frank Flinchok do the pass-

ing. Wisconsin will have a slight edge

over Iowa. The Badgers came out

for their game with Northwestern's

Wildcats tomorrow. The team will

go direct to Dyche Stadium for a

light workout.






