

DR. WILL SCOTT, I. U. PROFESSOR, DIES HERE AT 60

Directed Biological Station
At Winona Lake for
Many Years.

Dr. Will C. Scott, noted biologist and Indiana University faculty member for 31 years, died yesterday in Robert Long Hospital where he had been a patient since June 25. He was 60.

Dr. Scott was in charge of the university biological station at Winona Lake and was an authority of fish native to this region. He had made extensive surveys for the State Conservation Department.

Born in Houston, Ind., in 1877, Dr. Scott was graduated from the Indiana State Normal School in 1905. He later received his A. M. and Ph. D. degrees from Indiana University.

Long prominent in scientific circles, Dr. Scott was past president of the Indiana Academy of Science, a member of the American Zoological Association and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

He was active in Bloomington civic affairs as well as University life. He was past president of the Bloomington Kiwanis Club and a member of the First Methodist Church and Masonic Lodge. His mother, Mrs. Priscilla Ann Scott, Indianapolis resident for many years, died here Oct. 9.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Naomi Scott, and a daughter, Miss Frances Scott, a student in the university. Funeral arrangements were to be completed today.

THOMAS POWELL SEARCY, who died Saturday, is to be buried in the Rossville Cemetery following funeral services at 9 a. m. tomorrow in the Moore & Kirk Northeast Funeral Home. He was 79.

Mr. Searcy, who had lived here since 1904, died in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mildred Parsons, 2328 N. Dearborn St. He was born in Marietta, Miss., in 1857 and moved to Indiana with his parents during the Civil War.

In 1886, Mr. Searcy was married to Miss Ladora Wilson, of Rushville, who died seven years ago. He was a bridge construction contractor.

30,427 Attend in September,
Increase of 210.

Enrollment in the Indiana Works Progress Administration educational classes and nursery schools during September totaled 30,427, an increase of 210 over the August total, John K. Jennings, State WPA administrator, reported today.

Of the total persons attending, 15,342 were women and girls and 15,255 were men and boys.

A total of 465 teachers, 19 less than were employed during August, conducted 1180 classes as compared with 1151 the preceding month, the report stated.
