President to Give Address in Behalf Of Nation's Community Fund Drives; Warden Lawes to Begin New Series

PLAYS RADIO THEATER HEROINE

Supreme Court Justice To Speak on School Anniversary.



Madge Evans, movie actress, is to play opposite Fred McMurray in "Up Pops the Devil" on the CBS-WFBM Radio Theater at 8 o'clock tonight.

President Roosevelt is to be heard in a radio address tonight at 9:30 o'clock over all three major networks.

Speaking from his Hyde Park home, the President will urge support of the nation's private health and welfare agencies in the 1937 Community Mobilization for Human Needs. He will stress the importance of city Community Funds. Besides providing help for the needy, these funds offer financial aid to agencies interested in training boys and girls.

Charles P. Taft, chairman of the drive's National Citizens Committee, will discuss the campaign. The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, directed by Otto Klemperer, is to provide the musical portion of the program. Local radio listeners may hear the program over WIRE.

Warden Lewis E. Lawes of Sing Sing Prison returns to the air tonight with a new series of programs, "Behind Prison Bars," to be heard at 9 o'clock over the NBC-Blue.

Mr. Lawes will depart from his custom in the "Twenty Thousand Years in Sing Sing" series in allowing members of the studio audience to participate. Questions on the causes and prevention of crime from penologists and others in the studio will be answered immediately by Warden Lawes.

Warden Lawes also plans to select one question received in the week's mail and answer it by means of a dramatized episode.

Justice Owen J. Roberts of the U. S. Supreme Court will be the principal speaker on the NBC-WIRE broadcast of the University of Pennsylvania's bicentennial celebration at 8:30 o'clock tonight. Mr. Justice Roberts, university President Thomas Gates, Robert T. McCracken, Bicentennial Committee chairman, and Thomas L. Parkinson, National Alumni Committee chairman, will address a dinner in Convention Hall, Philadelphia. The broadcast replaces the Hour of Charm program usually heard at that hour.

Phil Lord is to inaugurate his new "Public Hero" series tonight at 9:30 p.m. over a split NBC-Red network. As you may have guessed, this program will deal with the nation's war on crime as did his "Gang Busters" program last year. Outstanding criminal cases and their solutions are to be dramatized each week as the show moves from city to city. The dramatizations will be based on actual incidents with the information being obtained from the police records.

Another Charles Martin dramatization will feature the "Johnny Presents" program at 7 p.m. over NBC-WLW. The efforts of Joyce McAllister to break up a Reno, Nev., narcotics ring will be the subject. Miss McAllister is to appear in person on the program.

Russ Morgan's orchestra will play a medley of the college songs of Boston University, Colgate and the University of Minnesota.

The Philadelphia Orchestra is back on the air with another bank-sponsored series this year. The inaugural broadcast is scheduled for tonight at 8 o'clock on NBC's Blue network stations. Neither WIRE nor WLW is booked to carry these concerts.

It will be remembered that the Philadelphia Orchestra has had a commercial program last year, sponsored by a group of American banks on Friday nights over CBS. As in this former series, there will be talks of a nonmusical nature on these programs, which are to be an hour long.

Eugene Ormandy, permanent conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, will direct the first concert. He has chosen the Prelude to Wagner's "Die Meistersinger"; Debussy's "Clair de Lune," probably in the transcription by his predecessor, Leopold Stokowski; the "Rosenkavalier" Waltzes of Richard Strauss, and Berlioz' "Rakoczy March."

Winners of both the "Metropolitan Auditions of the Air" and the new "Rising Musical Stars" contest, which began last night, are to be paid off in cash as well as glory at the season's end. In addition to a contract with America's leading opera company, the Metropolitan Auditions winners will receive checks for \$1000 each from the program's sponsor, a
