More Strikes, Says Dobbs

Announcing the Banquet strike, Mr. Dobbs said: "There will be more strikes."

He declared that the International Brotherhood had promised support of a strike at a mass meeting last night in the Athenaeum.

Of the three plants which originally were struck, only one, the Farns Ice Cream Co., 131 N. Alabama St., was reported making deliveries today.

Officials of the Weber Milk Co., 1225 Craft St., and Capitol Dairies, Inc., 1213 N. Sherman Drive, the other two involved in the original strike, said there was no change in the strike at their plants.

At the Banquet Co., Mr. Perry said some of the drivers walked out this morning, but none were told deliveries were to be suspended.

"There were no picket lines in front of the plants, however," he said.

"There were still plenty of men left inside the plant so that we were able to put all our trucks on the street. I don't know whether the men who walked out belonged to the union or not."

Picket Line at Capitol

Capital Dairies was the only one of the four struck plants where officials reported a picket line. No disorder was reported.

A. W. Buescher, Weber Milk Co. secretary, said his company was not delivering, but that some people still were coming to the plant to buy milk.

"It looks to me like this thing is all over," W. R. Kemper, Furnas Ice Cream Co. sales manager, said. "There are no pickets in front of our place. The men have been coming back to work recently until now.



PEATS MAY ASK 'LABOR HOLIDAY'

Union Secretary Threatens Action if Negotiations Do Not 'Succeed.'

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Text of Coller Order

The text of the Coller order to distributors follows:

As Milk Administrator of the Marion County Marketing Area in the State of Indiana, it becomes my duty to call to your attention that under Section 7, Subdivisions D and E of the State Milk Control Law, as found in the Acts of 1937 at Page 1065, your company made application for a license and represented that it had the facilities properly to conduct the business for which the license was sought and granted.

It has come to my attention that you have been at the present time, complying with Section 8, Subdivision F of said Act, thereby interfering with an ample supply of milk for the inhabitants of Marion County which, under the terms of the Act, is declared to be injurious to public health, public welfare and to trade and commerce, and evidence of course of conduct on your part tending to the demoralization of the industry and an evidence of the violation of the Act.

"Therefore, it becomes my duty, and I do hereby notify you that you are to resume the delivery of milk to the public of the City of Indianapolis and County of Marion, beginning on the morning of Oct. 19, 1937.

Your failure to comply with this order will require you to file charges with the Indiana Milk Control Board requesting the revocation of your license.

MRS. MINTON PLANS RETURN TO INDIANA


WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (U. P.) —

\$185,000 SET ASIDE FOR STATE FARM AID

Indiana's share of the \$9,500,000 Federal Government fund for tenant farmers to buy farms is to be \$185,582. John O. Calvin, Rural Resettlement State Supervisor, announced today.

The money, allotted under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenancy Act, is to be made available as loans to any "person who makes his livelihood on farms," Mr. Calvin explained.

Supervisors in each county are to take applications.
