

Home Auxiliary Works To Give Orphans Fun Like Riley Described

Women Teach Children Dancing, Sewing and Music, Accompany Them on Trips to Doctor and Dentist and Aid in Making False Faces.

With the Auxiliary to the Children's Bureau of the Indianapolis Orphans' Home on the alert, "little orphan Annie" can be pretty happy without "coming to our house to stay." At yesterday's executive committee meeting at the home of Mrs. Robert Ferriday Jr., there was considerable planning of how to give the children "the mostest fun."

Teaching the youngsters dancing, sewing and music, chaperoning them on picnics, swimming parties, trips to Kiddie Land and the Children's Theater are some of the activities in which the Auxiliary is engaged. Each of the 30 active members devotes 52 hours a year to Orphans' Home work. A volunteer motor corps drives the boys and girls to the dentist and hospital clinics when occasion demands. Auxiliary members also answer the telephone and work at the switchboard.

Mrs. William W. Garstang and Mrs. Oscar Jose have, for three years, assisted the recreational director during the hours after school when the children could not play out of doors. Last week they helped 15 boys make false faces from paper sacks and crepe paper. Grotesque masks with features characteristic of various nationalities caused shrieks of delight and an occasional hint that "the Gobbles-uns 'll get you if You Don't Watch Out!"

Each year the organization undertakes a fund-raising project. For the past two years it has sponsored performances of the Cole Bros.-Clyde Beatty circus in order to raise funds for the recreational and vocational activities of the Children's Bureau. From the money thus raised a supplemental scholarship to Franklin College has been provided for one boy; one girl has been sent to the City Hospital Nurses' Training School and another girl's tuition to business school has been paid. In addition, the group has helped to equip the girls' social room at the home.

The Auxiliary, now in its fifth year, is directly under the supervision of the Children's Bureau and two members attend the Bureau's monthly board meetings. At monthly luncheon meetings members hear talks by social workers from the Children's Bureau. Mrs. Jesse Fletcher is board adviser to the Auxiliary.

In explaining the organization's work Mrs. Robert L. Mason, president, said: "When a child is referred to the Children's Bureau of the Indianapolis Orphans' Home, it may be referred to the home or for placement. Of the 535 children in care, 67 are in the home. The others are placed in the community, mostly in boarding homes. Although the children with whom we work immediately are in the home, our program includes giving opportunities to children in boarding homes as well as to those in the institution."

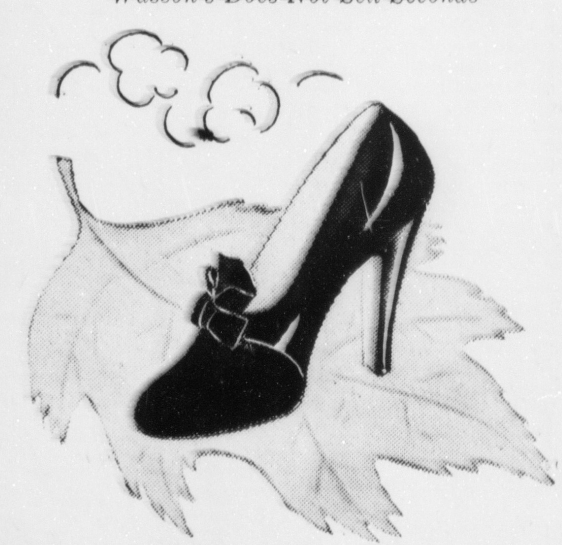
