

FEDERAL CENSUS WILL BE TESTED IN CHECK HERE

House - to - House Canvass
Set in Heaviest Areas
Of Unemployed.

The Government's "renumeration" to test the accuracy of the national unemployment census was to begin in Indianapolis today over an unemployed area.

Here and in several districts, chosen in a drawing last week by President Roosevelt, a house-to-house canvass is to be made where the heaviest concentration of unemployed is known to exist.

The personal count is to be compared with the count tallied in the regular census, concluded Saturday.

The average difference, if any, is to be computed in arriving at the national unemployment total to be tabulated in Washington.

WPA Employees Checked

At the same time WPA officials opened a check on their employees to determine the number that failed to fill out unemployment cards.

Tabulators here are to designate individuals who listed themselves as WPA employees or NRA aid recipients. Those whose cards fail to appear in the tallies will be interviewed to ascertain reasons for their failure to co-operate in the poll.

First shipment of tallies from outlying smaller postoffices began to arrive here, swelling the total count. When cards tabulated throughout the state are collected here, they are to be separated by counties to determine the concentration of unemployed by districts.

Results of the local count, according to Mr. Seidensticker, together with the census cards, are to be sent to headquarters in Washington for the final count.

THIEVES TAKE \$221 HERE OVER WEEK-END

Burglars and stickup men who took more than \$221 from four business houses here over the week-end were hunted by police today.

Herald employees in a rear room, two men, one armed, took more than \$87 in a grocery store robbery in the 5100 block College Ave., Robert Pavey, manager, reported to police.

He said the robbers walked into the store Saturday night and said "This is a stickup." The larger one drew a .38-caliber revolver, he said.

Seventy-five dollars in cash was taken by an armed robber in a grocery store holdup in the 700 block N. Senate Ave., Morris Talesnick, 3051 Park Ave., owner, told police. The man fled north on Senate Ave. he said.


BOETCHER TO BE HONORED

27 ARE SEIZED IN MORALS RAIDS

Held After Police Close Five
Establishments in North-
ern Indiana.

MICHIGAN CITY, Nov. 22 (U.P.)—Twenty-five women and two men were held here today on morals charges following raids last night by State Police on five resorts in La Porte and St. Joseph Counties.

Those arrested were questioned by Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents concerning a suspected white slavery ring. The G-Men refused to disclose what their questioning revealed but it was reported that proprietors of the establishments might be charged with Federal income tax evasion.

Twenty-four state police, led by Lieut. Ray Fisher, raided the five resorts in La Porte County, arrests made at the Homestead and the Blue Moon, both about two miles east of here, and at an establishment located in an abandoned school house.

In St. Joseph County, state troopers raid the Fan Inn, eight miles east of South Bend, and the RiverSide Inn, east of Mishawaka.

Sixteen women seized in the La Porte County raids were being held in the La Porte County jail. They probably will be tried on morals charges.

Nine women and two men were arrested in the St. Joseph County raids. They are expected to appear before the justice of the peace in South Bend.

Police also said they seized a number of slot machines.

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GRAVEL PLANT IS ORDERED OUT OF WHITE RIVER

Preliminary Step to Channel
Widening; Removal Is
Effective April 15.

City Engineer Henry B. Steeg, Indianapolis Flood Control Commission president, announced today the Indiana Gravel Co. had been ordered to remove its plant from White River near 14th St. by April 15.

He said the order was preliminary to beginning one of the commission's major projects in flood control.

The commission will undertake to widen the channel and straighten the bend where White River meets with Fall Creek at 10th St., "the most dangerous section from 10th St. to the County line," he said.

Work will be started next year. The project also will widen a bridge over Fall Creek at Indiana Ave., after widening of the channel.

The commission recently acquired 10 acres of land where the plant of the Indiana Gravel Co. stands from the Patrick Ward estate. The lease of the company expired Nov. 1.
