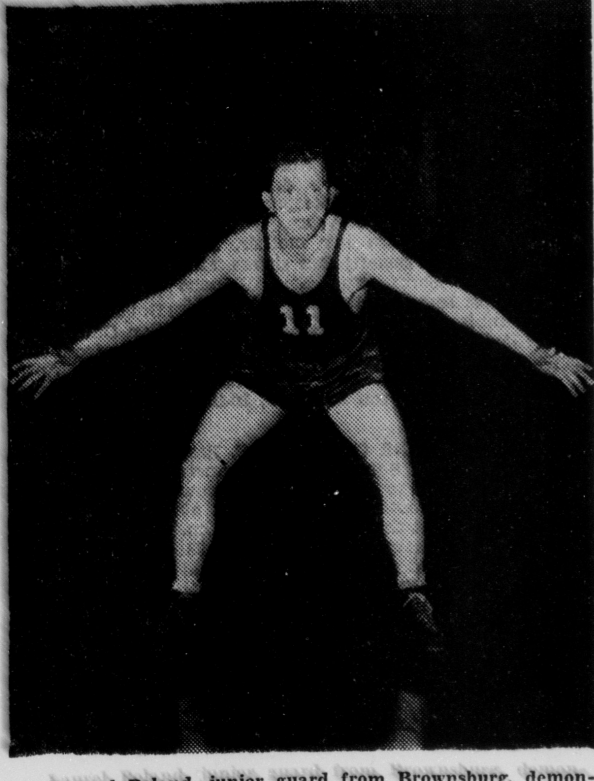

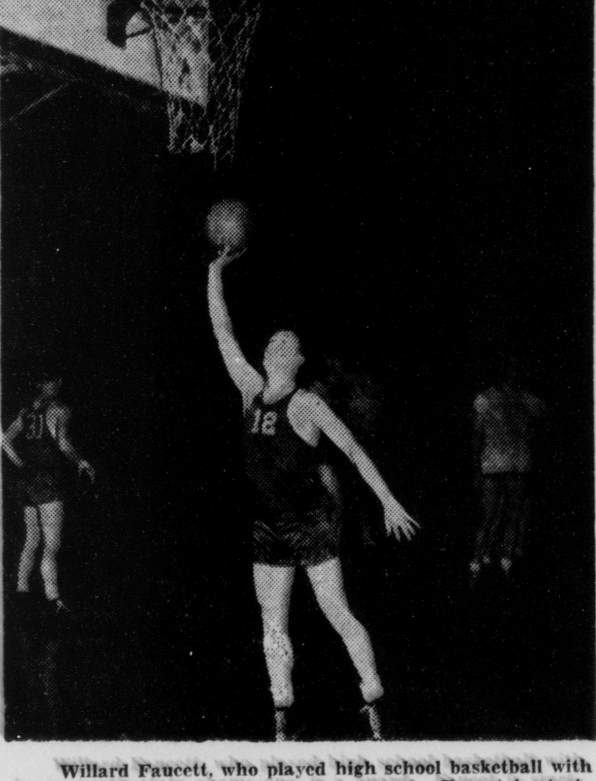
Introducing Jerome Stienor, sophomore from Berne, who is one of Butler's most promising net prospects.

Gophers First, I. U. Is Third In Final Big Ten Standing

Lack of Reserves Big Handicap to Hoosiers; Purdue in Four-Way Tie for Fourth Position.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—Minnesota's Golden Gophers closed the books today on their poorest football season since 1933—and still wound up with another undisputed Big Ten championship.

For the first time in four years they had no claim to national honors. Nebraska and Notre Dame saw to that. But outweighing those two defeats were five straight victories against Conference foes who no longer feared the once-mighty scourge of the West.

Ohio State, only one of the title contenders the Gophers failed to meet, finished second with five victories and a single defeat—by Indiana. Indiana barely finished in third place, Northwestern, Michigan, Wisconsin and Purdue wound up in a four-way tie for fourth place. Illinois was eighth, Chicago ninth and Iowa finished at the bottom of the heap.

Minnesota clinched its first undisputed title since 1934 against Wisconsin Saturday, 13 to 6. The Gophers scored in the first period and kicked the extra point to decide the game. Wisconsin hung on grimly, scored on Howie Weiss' seven-yard run around left end but failed to convert. The Gophers settled their business with another long touchdown march in the final period.

How Minnesota Won

Ohio State rolled over Michigan for the fourth time in a row, 21 to 0; Purdue upset Indiana, 13 to 7, in their annual free-for-all for the famed Old Oaken Bucket; Illinois dumped Chicago with three touchdowns in the second half, 21 to 0; Notre Dame defeated Northwestern, 7 to 0, and Nebraska routed Iowa, 28 to 0.

Here's how the Gophers won their crown:

1. Defeated Indiana, 6 to 0. Bo McMillin felt he had a chance to lick the Gophers when Nebraska turned the trick, 14 to 9, the previous week. Still, Indiana outgained Minnesota every place but in scoring territory and held them without a first down in the second half.

2. Crushed Michigan, 39 to 6. This was billed as Minnesota's comeback. They came back with 39 points after trailing, 6 to 0, scoring 13 points in each of the last three periods.

3. Routed Iowa, 28 to 0. After losing to Notre Dame, 7 to 6, the Gophers woke up in this one, scored

Fete Tonight For Purdue

Link to Be Added to the Old Oaken Bucket.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Nov. 22 (U. P.).—A celebration in honor of Purdue University's football squad and coaches for the 13-to-7 triumph over Indiana which returned the "Old Oaken Bucket" to the Boilermakers camp will be held at the Kiwanis Club here tonight.

Highlighting the banquet and a speaking program on which several prominent Indiana persons are scheduled, will be the ceremony of affixing the "P" link for the eighth time in history of the 13-year-old trophy, marking Purdue's latest victory.

Speakers of the evening include the Hon. Michael L. Fansler, judge of the Indiana Supreme Court, and a Notre Dame football star from 1902 to 1904, Elmer Layden, head coach at Notre Dame, Edward C. Elliott, president of Purdue, and Mal Elward, acting head coach of the Boilermakers.

Other members of the coaching staff and several players also are scheduled to speak.

Featuring the program will be the announcement of letter awards to varsity and freshman varsity football squads, election of next year's captain and selection of the team's most valuable player during the 1937 season.

The Boilermaker victory at Bloomington Saturday enables them to finish the season a tie in fourth place in the Big Ten standings.

Bears Sure of Bid to Bowl

Players Said to Favor Pitt As Opponent.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 22 (U. P.).—California University's "wonder" team will be invited today to represent the West in the Rose Bowl, an honor which is accompanied by the Pacific Coast Conference football title and the equivalent to a cash bonus of almost \$100,000 in gate receipts.

The invitation, fourth to be tendered the Golden Bears in the modern history of the New Year's Day classic, will be accorded by the 10 conference members. Each institution, including California, will telegraph its vote to Dr. Hugh C. Willett, University of Southern California instructor who is Conference president.

The bid will not become official until Dr. Willett counts the votes shortly before noon, but he said the outcome was a "foregone" conclusion.

California won the championship Saturday by defeating the runner-up, Stanford, 13-0. The Bears finished their schedule without defeat. They won six Conference games and tied one, a 0-0 deadlock with Washington.

As the Bears were voted in, speculation on the choice of an "Eastern" opponent was rife. Two statements tended to clarify slightly the conflicting rumors.

Several team members, among them Bob Herwig and Sam Chapman, disclosed that an informal straw ballot taken among several of the varsity players indicated a preference for Pittsburgh. A year ago a poll of the Washington players indicated a similar preference and the Panthers were invited.

2. Indication that the Bears officials will withhold their selection until next week, apparently to await developments on the Western and Southern fronts, where the supposed big three—Pitt, Alabama and Fordham—complete their schedules. Alabama meets Vanderbilt, another eligible, at Nashville, Tenn., Thursday; Pitt meets Duke at Durham, N. C., Saturday; Fordham plays N. Y. U. in New York Saturday.

Of the other aspirants, Dartmouth, lone undefeated Ivy college, has ended its season as has Lafayette; Holy Cross meets Boston College and Villanova comes here to play Loyola. Yale apparently was eliminated by the Harvard upset Saturday.
