

M'CRAY RITES WILL BE HELD AT HOME HERE

Benjamin Harrison's Friend
Dies at 83 After Three
Weeks' Illness.

Franklin McCray, Indianapolis attorney and Republican Party worker, who died Saturday in his home, 217 E. 23d St., is to be buried in Crown Hill tomorrow following funeral services at 2 p. m. in McNeely & Sons mortuary. He was 83. Mr. McCray had remained active in legal practice until he became seriously ill three weeks ago. He was a friend and intimate of Benjamin Harrison, acquaintance of Woodrow Wilson and known among political and legal leaders of the state and nation.

He was born in Marion County and had lived here all his life. He had served in the State Legislature and was a former Criminal Court judge.

Attended Three Colleges
Mr. McCray attended Franklin College, Valparaiso University, and was graduated from Denison University in Ohio. For five years after his graduation he taught school, then began his legal work.

He had served as assistant prosecuting attorney and in 1894 was elected Criminal Court judge. He was a member of the Legislature during the administration of Governor James P. Goodrich.

Mr. McCray was a member of the Indianapolis Bar Association, Indiana State Bar Association and the American Bar Association. He also was a member of Central Christian Church and the Century Club.

Survivors are the wife, Mrs. Katherine E. Lampord McCray, and a brother, Samuel McCray, Los Angeles.
