

INDIANA C. OF C. LEADERS TO BE LUNCH GUESTS

Governor Will Urge Greater
Co-operation to Obtain
New Industries.

Chamber of Commerce officials throughout Indiana are to attend a luncheon meeting at the Columbia Club tomorrow noon to hear Governor Townsend urge co-operation between his office and business men in developing new industries within the State.

The meeting, sponsored by the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce, is to hear Carl B. Fritsch, managing director of the Farm-Chemical Council of Dearborn, Mich. He is to outline plans for "Forging an Alliance Between Industry and Agriculture."

SMOKE CONFERENCE SCHEDULED TODAY

Councilmen Are to Meet
With League Aids.

As City Councilmen prepared to meet with the Smoke Abatement League at noon today, a resolution supporting the League was adopted by the Indianapolis Apartment Owners Association.

In a letter to the Councilmen yesterday, Dr. Herman G. Morgan, Health Board secretary and League president, said the purpose of today's meeting at the Hotel Washington was to acquaint councilmen with the proposed smoke ordinance to be presented at the next council meeting.

William P. Sneathen, apartment association president, told owners yesterday that the association is organizing a school for janitors and custodians in smoke abatement methods.

"There are 70,000 structures in the city, 1100 of which are apartments," he said. "The 70,000 or more persons must be taught how to fire their furnaces or stoves if smoke is to be curtailed."

U. S. DEATH RATE DROP IS REPORTED

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (U. P.)—The Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. reported today that the mortality rate among the white population of the United States had decreased to such an extent that there were 768,402 fewer deaths in 1935 than in 1930.

Statisticians said that the 1935

death toll of 1,207,359 would have been 1,275,761, if the 1930 rate had prevailed. The greatest decrease was in the tuberculosis mortality rate, resulting in 173,000 fewer deaths in 1935.
