

CHANDLER GAINS ANTI-NEW DEAL PARTY SUPPORT

Seems Determined to Oppose Barkley in Kentucky Senatorial Race.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—With Anti-New Deal Democrats in Washington rallying to his support, Governor A. B. (Happy) Chandler appears almost certain to challenge Alben W. Barkley, majority leader of the Senate, in Kentucky's senatorial primary.

President Roosevelt, with whom the young Governor conferred yesterday, apparently does not dissuade him.

Governor Chandler is even thinking of a move to advance the primary from the scheduled date, Aug. 8, to spring or early summer. August, he explained, is a very hot month—not the best time to get out a full vote. But some Kentuckians here saw another reason—the fact that it would be difficult for Senator Barkley, as majority leader, to leave Washington during the Congressional session.

He Seems Confident

The change could be made by the Kentucky Legislature. Governor Chandler said the Legislature has never voted against his wishes.

Among those who called on the Governor at his hotel were Senators Tydings (D. Md.) and Byrd (D. Va.).

"Last time I checked up," the Governor said, "Senator Guffey and Lord MacCaulay were about the only ones for Barkley."

Mr. Chandler is convinced he can beat Mr. Barkley. He indicated that the President had attempted to convince him he was still young and needed experience in the national field, and that the party powers would keep him in mind.

'Showed Me Mountain Tops'

"They took me up on the mountain tops and showed me the promised land and said I was young," Governor Chandler said. "But I said that had been held against me for a long time. And I pointed out that the President himself had always moved ahead when the opportunity offered."

The Governor said he had discussed with the President the possibility of naming Senator Logan (R. Ky.) to the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which would permit Mr. Chandler to go to the Senate without unseating Mr. Barkley. But he said he didn't urge this, although he agreed that it might be a means of maintaining party peace in Kentucky.

BIDS DUE TODAY ON \$377,500 ROAD WORK

The State Highway Commission today was to receive bids on 14 bridges, one grade separation and drainage work having a total estimated cost of \$377,500.

These projects, to be financed by State and Federal-aid funds, are to be located in Hamilton, Gibson, Morgan, Wabash, Allen, Marshall, St. Joseph, Parke, Sullivan, Martin, White and Perry Counties.

Commission engineers said the grade separation is to carry Road 13 traffic under the New York Central railroad one-half mile south of Noblesville.

INDIANA TO OBSERVE SOCIAL HYGIENE DAY

Indiana will join the national observance of Social Hygiene Day tomorrow.

Gen. John J. Pershing, National Anti-Syphilis Committee chairman, will broadcast over a national hook-up.

Mrs. Evans Woolen, temporary chairman of the Indiana Committee, said the observance would mark the beginning of renewed efforts by the organization to bring before the public, through lectures and publicity, the need of stamping out social diseases.

M'CART ATTENDS I. C. C. RAIL RATE HEARING

Perry McCart, Indiana Public Service Commission chairman, and Ralph Hanna, public counselor, were in Washington today attending the Interstate Commerce Commission hearings on the petition of railroads for a 15 per cent freight rate increase.

The railroads have asked the Indiana Commission to grant them the same increases on intrastate commerce that the Federal body might give them on interstate shipments.

FIVE AWARDED PRISON PAROLES

One Sentenced From Marion County Among Those Receiving Clemency.

One man sentenced from the Marion County Criminal Court was among five State Prison inmates receiving paroles today from the State Clemency Commission. The Commission remitted one fine, continued two cases and denied 10 petitions for leniency.

Charles Mellans, found guilty of stealing a number of Oriental rugs from Indianapolis homes, was sentenced to a term of four years for second degree burglary. The Commission, in granting the parole, reported he had a clear institution record and would be given employment in a grocery.

Three of the others given paroles were convicted on robbery charges. They were Clifton Edward Rogers, sentenced in Vigo County Circuit Court May 6, 1931, to 12 years; Arlein Wilson, sentenced in Clark County Circuit Court Jan. 20, 1934, to 15 years, and Oscar J. King, sentenced in Lake County Criminal Court Nov. 4, 1931, and given 10 years.

The fifth man given a parole was Orville T. Armstrong, sentenced in Elkhart County Superior Court Dec. 8, 1936, to a 2-to-14 year term for forgery.

RUCKELSHAUS RAPS STATE BEER SYSTEM

Democratic Party governmental "innovations" and the State beer importing system today had been criticized by John K. Ruckelshaus, Republican State Executive Committee chairman, in an address to the Irvington Republican Club.
