

## HENRY C. ATKINS TO BE HONORED AT 'Y' BANQUET

Trustees, Directors to Pay  
Tribute to His 36 Years  
With Organization.

Henry C. Atkins Sr., president of H. C. Atkins & Co., is to be honored by the Indianapolis Y. M. C. A. boards of trustees and directors at a dinner tomorrow night for his 36 years of service with the organization.

Dr. W. P. Dearring is to speak at the recognition dinner, to be held at the Y. M. C. A. on Marion, association president, presided over by Everett J. Holloway, executive secretary. The resolution was drafted

by a committee named by Clyde E. Pike, president.

Legislation which would authorize Mayor Boettcher to name a five-man authority has been pending before Council for some time.

HUNTINGTON VETOES  
HEAT UTILITY PLANS

HUNTINGTON, March 31 (U. P.)—Mayor Clare W. H. Bangs received another setback last night when the City Council voted down his proposal that Huntington go into the heating business.

By a vote of 4 to 2 the Council indefinitely suspended ordinances to

combine the City waterworks with the municipally-owned light plant and establish a steam-heating utility.
