

FILINGS HEAVY; MANY TO COME; DEADLINE NEAR

Candidates Still Awaited for
Score of County
Offices.

With candidates rushing to meet the filing deadline Saturday mid-night, records disclosed today there are a score of County offices and several Township posts for which no candidates have yet filed.

The same situation prevails in respect to many State and Congressional posts. No Republican candidate has filed for Congress, 12th District, although Charles W. Jewett, former Indianapolis Mayor, has announced he will enter the race.

At the Secretary of State's office, it was reported that there were nearly 120 State posts, including State Representatives and Senators, Judges and Prosecutors, for which no candidates have filed thus far.

Frederick R. Bonfield, Republican, today announced his withdrawal as a candidate for judge of Criminal Court in the interests of "party harmony." Since Mr. Bonfield announced his candidacy, Walter C. Pritchard has entered the race for the Criminal Court nomination, with the reported backing of several G. O. P. factions.

Two File for Congress

Two Republican candidates filed for Congress, Fifth District. They were Forest A. Harless, Kokomo, former American Legion state commander, and Ora Simmons, Marion, Townsend Club leader.

Republicans filing for State Representative were Wesley T. Wilson, 1541 Leonard St.; William Heim, Warren Township; J. Blair Mills, Lynn; Elias W. Levi, Alexandria, N. West St.; Charles R. Turner, New Albany.

Candidates filing for State Senator were George O. Rafert, Fortville, Republican, and Martin J. Cleary, Ft. Wayne, Democrat, incumbent. Declarations for County offices were filed by Clarence Gaumer, Democrat, for Assessor; William J. Brown, Democrat, Sheriff; Martin Walpole, Democrat, Auditor; Lewis C. Williams, Democrat, Recorder; Frank Cones, Republican, for Treasurer; Harry K. Hohl, Democrat, Commissioner, Third District.

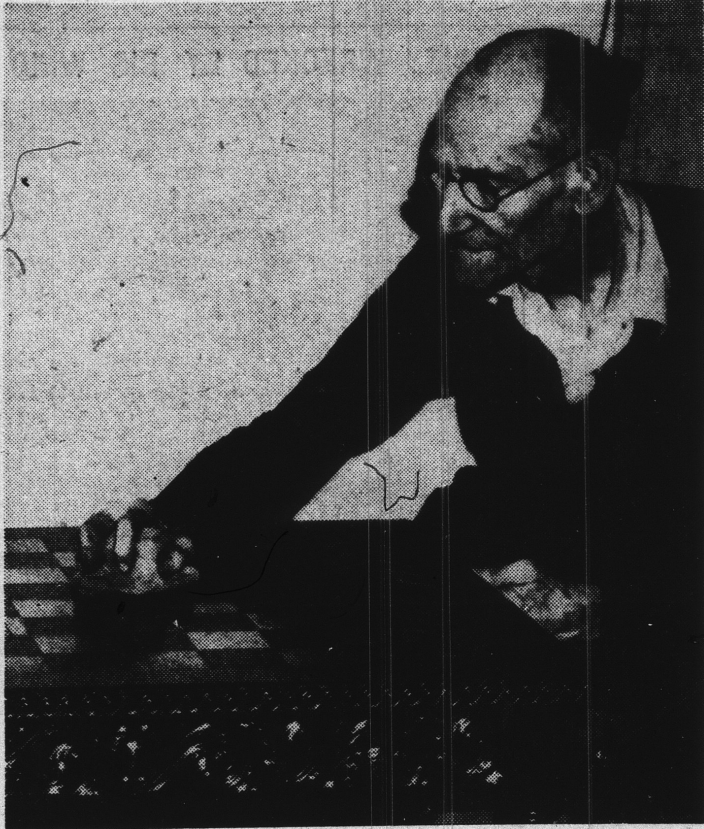

BANK DEMANDS FBI PUT LOOT IN TRUST

A suit asking that \$233 robbery loot allegedly taken from a bank bandit by G-Men be placed in a trust fund, was on file in Circuit Court today.

The action, brought by the Maryland Casualty Co. and the Farmers Bank of Milton, Ky., named Herold H. Reinecke, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Indianapolis office, as defendant.

The suit charged that the loot was taken from William Burgess at the time he was arrested on an accusation of holding up the Milton, Ky., bank. The bank asked that the money be held in trust and returned to it after disposition of the Burgess case.

TRUST WINS TAX REFUND
