

## LONDON GOSSIP LINKS BARBARA AND FREDERICK

Kaiser's Grandson Is Seen  
As Cause of Countess'  
Marital Rift.

LONDON, July 7.—A social triumph which back-fired caused the final marital rift between Countess Barbara Hutton Haugwitz-Reventlow and her husband, circles closely connected with the couple said today.

Prince Frederick of Prussia, grandson of the former German Kaiser, was mentioned as the unwitting center of the dispute, and as the man whom, according to testimony at Bow Street police court today, Countess Barbara Haugwitz-Reventlow threatened to "shoot like a dog."

The Prince came to London mainly to study British financial and business methods. A bachelor, 26, handsome, he mingled in the best London society and according to gossip was eyed by many blue-blooded mothers as an ideal husband for their debutante daughters.

He is a social prize, but according to informants Count Haugwitz-Reventlow, in the social sense, barged him as a guest at Winfield House, the Countess' home here where she embarked on a London social career.

### Count Becomes Angry

The story went that the Countess liked the Prince and that the Count became angry.

Prince Frederick, according to informants, seemed unaware that he was the center of anybody's interest or that the social courtesies which he had received were causing trouble.

The Count, according to informants, became increasingly anxious at the friendship between his wife and the Prince and finally demanded that the Countess stop seeing him.

Informants then explained the circumstances of an alleged demand for five million dollars by the Count at the time of a separation. Attorney for the Countess mentioned such a demand at the Bow Street hearing.

It was said the Count had no idea of demanding any money from the Countess, but that he mentioned five million dollars—calling it a "fantastic" figure himself, according to the court evidence—hope that he could shock his wife into giving up her friendship with the Prince.

### Report Threatening Letters

Other and more dramatic events were said also to have been really nothing but an effort by the Count to discourage the friendship.

Before the Bow Street hearing, it had been reported that Prince Frederick received threatening messages from France—the count was then in Paris—and that he was connected with the Haugwitz-Reventlow dispute.

To a United Press correspondent who visited him at his offices in the United Potash Co. in the financial district, the Prince then laughed at the reports. He said that he had received no threatening letters of any sort for two years since he had met the Countess socially only within the last month, and that he had seen her only three times in all.

Prince Frederick said he thought the Count and Countess were very charming, but that his acquaintance with them was only slight and that any mention of his name in connection with them was absurd. He said he was sorry if he had caused any embarrassment to the Countess.

The Prince and his sister Princess Cecile were in Wales today, guests of Sir Archibald Weigall. They visited the Royal agricultural show at Cardiff yesterday. The Duke of Kent, brother of King George, was at the fair as the official representative of the Royal family.

### Barbara and Lance May Go to Rome

VENICE, July 7 (UPI)—The Excelsior Hotel has reserved a suite of rooms which Countess Barbara Hutton Haugwitz-Reventlow and her 2-year-old son Lance are expected to occupy Aug. 1, it was reported today.

### HEALTH BUREAU PLANS SURVEY

Occupational Hazards to Be  
Studied in 195 Plants  
of Marion County.

The State Health Board's new bureau of industrial hygiene will survey potential occupational disease hazards in Indiana industries starting next week, according to Dr. Louis W. Spolyard, bureau director.

The survey will start in Marion County, where 195 plants employing 25,000 workers will be studied by bureau engineers. They will survey environment, atmospheric pollution, lighting, heating, raw materials and by-products as they relate to the health of employees.

The state-wide survey will take in 1476 of Indiana's 3813 manufacturing plants, picked "at random" to get a representative selection, Dr. Spolyard said.

The survey will be made by 13 men, who will attend a three-day training school in the Indiana University School of Medicine auditorium starting Monday. The survey is expected to last about six months.

### ROCHESTER TO HAVE NEW WATERWORKS

ROCHESTER, July 7 (UPI)—The City Council will accept a PWA grant of \$36,000 and a Government loan of \$44,000 for installation of new waterworks here, it was reported today.

The council also met with James Bodine, head of the Indiana PWA office at Indianapolis, who said that work on an airplane hanger 60x80 feet at the city Airport near Lake Manitou as soon as hanger plans are approved by Government engineers.






