

X-RAY AT COST PLAN ATTACKED BY LOCAL ORGAN

Dr. Charles Myers' Proposal Discussed in Medical Bulletin.

The Indianapolis Medical Society Bulletin, a publication, today attacked editorially the plan proposed recently by Dr. Charles Myers, City Hospital superintendent, to furnish all physicians and their patients with clinical and X-Ray laboratory work at cost.

Dr. Myers proposed that Federal funds be sought to build and equip a laboratory, perhaps at Medical Center, and to make its services available for all Marion County physicians at operating cost.

He advanced the plan as a partial solution to the high cost of medicine for the middle-salaried family, and as a "substantial contribution to preventive medicine."

Plan Is Assailed
The bulletin editorial said: "MEDICAL ECONOMICS HYSTERIA"
"It can't happen here! What? A proposed tax-bill, and equipped clinic to do X-Ray and medical laboratory work on a cost basis. But it did—right in the newspapers. Why? Was it part of the New Deal program for the more abundant life? Was it looking toward better salaries for a group of doctors? Did it originate from the people it was supposed to benefit? Why were the really expensive forms of medical service not included in this cost basis proposal such as surgery, prolonged medical care and hospitalization, expensive drugs, etc.?"

The rank and file of the medical profession render the same service to all patients who come into their offices regardless of whether the patient is to pay the regular fee, a pro-rated fee based on income, or, if without income, no fee at all. These doctors know that the average American family can meet the ordinary expenses of the more up-to-date medical care if it is given the opportunity to work at a reasonable wage and the sickness expense is prorated to the income. They also know that a self-respecting American citizen wants to get his money's worth in the same manner that he gets his other needs and not by government edict. What he wants is a steady job with a good income with an opportunity to exercise his own judgment and not a lot of unnecessary cut-rate laboratory examinations. If such a laboratory were built and staffed with qualified physicians, the actual charges would be the same or more than the present schedule of fees. Probably more when one considers the loss of efficiency in public work.

Interpretation Necessary
"Of course, the actual production of X-Ray films is not the practice of radiology any more than the making of an electrocardiograph is the practice of cardiology. Electrocardiographs can be produced practically at a very low cost, but from a clinical standpoint they are worth no more than the celluloid film they are made on, unless interpreted by a cardiologist.
"There is a large amount of X-Ray work being done by physicians who have not qualified as radiologists, and without doubt the fees charged for such examinations should be considered unreasonably high.

Unpredictable major medical expense is the type of medical service financed through the Medical Service Plan at the Medical and Dental Business Bureau and not the smaller fees for X-Ray and laboratory examinations.
"These are figures for the past 17 months . . . the year of 1937 and the first five months of 1938:

Completed . . . 1,228; amount \$185,787.29
Hospitalization . . . 1,093; amount \$5,944.22
Doctors' fees . . . \$108,783.57

From the above figures it is apparent that more than 85 per cent of the patients seeking financial help had illness that required hospitalization."

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Courtiers Gasp At Debutantes' Daring Dresses

LONDON, July 7 (U. P.).—Buckingham Palace attaches were "dumfounded" last night when they noticed that the dress of one of the debutantes presented to King George at the third royal court of the season, resembled a beach costume composed of brassiere and skirt.

Courtiers were "horrified" when another debutante paraded in front of the King in a dress cut exceedingly low in the back.

Then they became "speechless" when a third debutante appeared in an ensemble with a 16th Century square neckline cut lower than any seen at a court since Victorian days when women wore "off the shoulder" gowns.

Hitherto, it had been an unofficial rule for debutantes to wear dresses which, without being too puritan-like, should not be too décolleté. It was understood, however, that in view of last night's "sensations" the authorities would take steps to see that in the future the gowns of those presented full Buckingham Palace traditions, being attractive without being unduly sensational.

LEAGUE URGES TRACK ACTION

Speed PWA Application, Is South Side Group's Appeal to City.

The South Side Civic League today made public a resolution urging Mayor Boeticher and the Works Board to "put forth all possible speed" in applying for a PWA grant to aid financing the proposed South Side track elevation project.

City Engineer Henry B. Steeg was in Chicago today making application with PWA regional officials there. He asked a grant of 45 per cent of the project's estimated \$3,085,000 cost.

The league's resolution, signed by its officers and trustees, said that South Side residents have sought the project for many years and that the Federal Government now has funds for municipal public improvements.

Asks Bridge Grant
Adopted June 30, the resolution said that Federal allotments must be made before Aug. 31 and that "one week already has elapsed since these funds were made available."

Mr. Steeg also took with him to Chicago an application for a PWA grant to aid construction of the 38th St. bridge over the Canal as part of the extension of 38th St. The league's resolution for grant for construction of the Warfield sanitary sewer and W. New York St. bridge over White River.

PWA officials have notified City officials that applications for grants for a Municipal Airport building and the improvement of S. East St. probably will be sent to Washington this week, Mr. Steeg said.

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STATE IS READY TO CLOSE CASE IN JONES TRIAL

'I'll Tell You Why,' Prober Quotes Defendant as Replying to Query.

DANVILLE, July 7.—Ray Seidle, investigator for the Marion County Prosecutor's office, today told a jury in the murder trial of Mrs. Etta Jones, that when he asked Mrs. Jones "why did you shoot Helen," she replied "I'll tell you why."

On cross-examination, Mr. Seidle said Mrs. Jones never finished her statement. Mrs. Jones is charged with the slaying last July 14 of 12-year-old Helen Schuler in Beech Grove.

Prosecutor Herbert M. Spencer said he hoped to close the State's case against the 38-year-old former Indianapolis rooming house operator this afternoon.

Others who testified for the State in Circuit Court were Dr. G. J. Tiley, Beech Grove physician, who said he attended the 12-year-old child at the St. Francis Hospital 10 minutes before she died of bullet wounds in the head and hip, and J. C. Rhea, another Beech Grove physician.

Technical testimony of police authorities also was introduced today, Prosecutor Herbert M. Spencer said.

The State was unable to establish the identification of the murder gun at the first trial last winter which ended in a hung jury.

Identifies Gun
But yesterday, John Eullis, a former roomer in Mrs. Jones' house, testified, "I'll have to say that is her gun" when shown the weapon which slew the child and wounded her stepmother, Mrs. Lottie Schuler.

Mr. Eullis said he had examined the gun when Mrs. Jones asked him to load it for her last year.

Sherriff testified that Mrs. Jones told him she carried a pistol in her pocketbook for nearly two weeks and that she identified as her own the gun which killed Helen.

Sheriff Testifies
He recounted Mrs. Jones' alleged version of the shooting. She had gone to the suburban Schuler home to arrange for music lessons for her daughter; had struggled with Mrs. Schuler for possession of the gun when Mrs. Schuler took it from Mrs. Jones' handbag; had seen Mrs. Schuler wounded accidentally during the struggle as the child's body lay on the floor.

Sheriff Ray declared several angles of Mrs. Jones' detailed version conflicted.

MAN DIES IN URBANA CRASH
FT. WAYNE, July 7 (U. P.).—Robert Burkholder, 21, Washburn County, died early today of injuries suffered in an automobile collision north of Urbana. Robert Sumpter was injured seriously in the crash.
