

NOTRE DAME RETAINS NO. 1 FOOTBALL LISTING

Williamson Rates Irish 99.9; Minnesota Tops Purdue

Illini Get 88.5 to Indiana's 81 While George Washington Team Is Ranked Above Butler Eleven.

Notre Dame emerged from the week-end games as the week's outstanding team of the nation—at the head of the Williamson Football System table with a rating of 99.9. The 52-to-0 score was the largest recorded between two supposedly major teams in many a year.

Kansas University was fresh from a 19-to-18 victory over Texas the week before and was expected by many prognosticators to be one of the nation's leaders.

The Williamson preliminary ratings set Notre Dame out as one of the country's major squads for 1938.

Minnesota this week is given a rating of 95 while the Purdue Boilermakers, the Gophers' opponents Saturday, are rated at 90. Illinois has an 88.5 rating while Indiana is given 81. Wabash rates 46.5 while Evansville, the Little Giants' next rivals, trail with 42. Hanover ranks at 47 above Central Normal of Danville, 43. George Washington University of Washington, D. C., whose eleven Butler plays has an 87 rating while the Bulldogs are given a 75.

NOTE—These post-game ratings represent each team's efficiency of consistent performance to date, calculated by the Williamson National Rating System. The ratings do not always indicate a direct cause of strength of each team as compared to all the others in the table, but in general they do indicate each team's relative strength in comparison with its scheduled opponents. The final ratings of the completed season, however, should be close to a 100 per cent measure of the strength of the respective teams. The percentage figure below (right-hand column) are the most important. The listing figures (left-hand column) are for convenience in giving the fractional differences in order.

Wabash Eager for Victory After Two Straight Losses

Little Giants Should Win in Battle With Evansville Saturday; Inexperienced Team Faces Tough Schedule.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Oct. 4.—The Little Giants of Wabash are hungry after two Saturday afternoons on which their touchdown ladder was empty. They are eager for the nourishment of victory and the reclamation of some of the football plaudits which once were the Wabash pride.

Two games and two defeats. Boys, is that doing the right thing by old Pete Vaughan in his 20th year of coaching here on the Scarlet campus?

Akron was abusive in its 38-to-0 lacing. Hanover's Panthers were surprising with their 14-to-6 superiority.

Saturday should see a triumph for the Giants. They go to Evansville and the Purple Aces appear to be bidding for a no-win record, having stopped 11 consecutive knockout punches.

Mr. Vaughan has trouble of course in the size of the squad and the experience of its members. The squad numbers only 34. Twenty-one of them are sophomores, six juniors and seven seniors, leaving the deduction, without any experting, that he has a green team.

And some of the grandstand experts are saying that maybe the reason Wabash isn't so dictatorial on the gridiron is that there is too much emphasis on books and classroom work. But that's the way it is and that's the way it's going to be, football success or football failure.

Local Boys Help

Five Indianapolis boys, three of them seniors, are doing their best to present Pete with compensation in the way of scores.

Dave Crockett, a 159-pounder from Shortridge, is the team's starting fullback and can do some sprinting, as was attested by his 45-yard dash against Hanover last week.

Bill Pack, a senior from the same school, is Pete's starting right halfback, and one of his best passers.

Jack Rich, a senior from Broad Ripple, is his starter at right guard. Others from Indianapolis are Steve Noland, sophomore tackle, and Henry Reber, senior guard.

Frank Kober, one of the starting ends, is a senior and one of only 11 "W" men here, while at the other terminal is Steve Gieris, lightweight sophomore.

Guarding with Rich is Gene Moloney, another sparse sophomore. Paul Sawyer, junior from Anderson, and Bill Hess, a sophomore, both big men, are at the tackles. John Wakely is starting center. He's from Danville, Ill.

Leonard Krauss, Hammond junior, is the quarterback. He weighs only 158, but won his letter in the last campaign. Eddie Macnamara, Hammond senior, rounds out the first string backfield.

Wabash has some other backs around in the persons of Walter Gray from Rushville, Bill Sabo, Martin Wulfin, Stanley Cochran, Jack Robinson, Donald Buehner and Douglas Smith.

Noland, Hess and Jim Adamson are the only ones who pack more than 200 pounds. The little fellows are coming here now. Stan Cochran, all the way from New York, weighs only 136 pounds.

Cochs Nipper's eleven, fresh from a 27 to 6 crushing of the Stivers of Dayton, O., second, will be battling Culver for the second time since 1933. The Cadets returned from Chicago with a 13 to 0 victory over the strong Calumet contingent.

Yesterday Coach Nipper ran his charges through a heavy offensive drill. Punting, passing and signal work occupied the backfield. Assistant Coach William Merrill stressed fundamentals and defensive play with the complete varsity line.

Quarterback Eugene Stauber who fractured his wrist in the Broad Ripple game, and Dick Worley, center, who has a broken hand, are unable as yet to rejoin the squad. Coach Nipper hopes them to be in shape for the Jefferson game, week after next.

Cathedral's pigskin artists today entered their second day of practice after an open day last week. Friday they meet Washington in the first of four games with local public schools. Yesterday Coach Joe Harmon held a blackboard drill and then the coaches do or either document blocking and tackling exercises.

Clayton Nichols and Wayne Montfort will battle Marvin Heckman and Bob Crouch for the unofficial best ball championship of the South Grove Golf Club next Sunday in a 36-hole match. Heckman and Crouch have not been beaten in 11 matches. The tournament has been run on a challenge basis.

Heckman and Nichols were club champions in 1936 and 1937 respectively, whereas Crouch and Montfort were runners-up in the State High School tournaments of the same years.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (U. P.).—Laruping Lou Nova, propelled by Lady Luck into the heavyweight fight picture, stood on his own feet today, a step closer to his dream of a title match with Joe Louis.

The San Francisco slugger, who was chosen as a substitute for Bob Pastor in Mike Jacobs' initial elimination tournament bout to find a summer challenger for Louis, scored a technical knockout over Gunnar Barlund of Finland before 8000 persons at Madison Square Garden last night.

Nova, a 2-5 underdog when he entered the ring, got up off the canvas after a third-round knockdown, and gave the rugged Finn a boxing lesson. He split Barlund's cheek under the left eye early in the sixth, and before the round was over had gashed the brow above that eye.

Nova never gave the wound a chance to close. He raked the left side of Barlund's face with right-hand blows that had the Finn bleeding so badly Referee Artie Donovan was forced to stop the battle midway of the round.

FILCHOCK HURLS TWO TOUCHDOWN PASSES

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (U. P.).—The Pittsburgh Pirates, who got off to a poor start in the National Football League, were regarded with new respect today after defeating the New York Giants 13-10 for their second straight victory.

Frank Filchock, former Indiana University star, tossed two touchdowns passes to the veteran Wilbur Sorter from West Virginia to give Pittsburgh the victory margin. Filchock played on the Indiana team last year.

The Pirates outfought and out-

gained the Giants to revenge an earlier setback by the New Yorkers. The win enabled the Pirates to move up from the Eastern Division cellar and dropped the Giants into it. Pittsburgh made 10 first downs and 166 yards by rushing, compared to seven and 104 for the Giants.
