LACK OF AVIATION TRAINING DECRID

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (U. P.)—Chairman Edward G. Noble of the Civil Aeronautics Authority today decried the Federal Government's failure to sponsor flying instruction for persons outside the military services.

In his first public address since taking office, Mr. Noble told the Washington Junior Board of Commerce that Europe begins aviation training in the kindergarten.

Outside of the CCC, "which gives some small vocational aviation ground training, not one penny of Government money goes to flying instruction outside of the military services," he said.

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UNIFORM AUTO CODE IS URGED

Lack of Age Limits in Some States Condemned by Administrators.

DETROIT, Oct. 7 (U. P.)—The biggest single need in regulating autos on the nation's streets and highways is a uniform code in every state instead of individualistic laws such as now exist, the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators was told today.

Thomas H. MacDonald of Washington, Federal Bureau of Roads chief, condemned the "inexcusably individualistic tendencies" of laws in some states. He urged the convention to take action toward drafting a uniform code applicable in every state.

"Some states have no age limit on drivers," he said. "Other states do not require a drivers license. Speed limits in towns and on highways vary in every state. Registration of driving by drivers, narcotics addiction and persons afflicted with mental diseases is unheard of in some states. These are particulars in which the states are deficient, and a uniform code for the nation's highways is the answer to this nation's traffic problems."

The only states not represented at the Association meeting were Maine, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada and Oregon.

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COLUMBUS DAY CELEBRATIONS ARE ARRANGED

Mayor Asks Proper Services As Many Groups Map Plans; Broadcast Set.

Preparations for observance of Columbus Day next Wednesday are being made by various local organizations, including the Knights of Columbus.

Mayor Boettcher has issued the proclamation:

"Whereas, the General Assembly of the State of Indiana has designated the 12th day of October, commonly known as Discovery Day, as a legal holiday for all purposes; and

"Whereas, the people of this community enjoy and have long enjoyed the glorious fruits of the daring achievements of the great discoverer,

"Now, therefore, I, Walter C. Boettcher, Mayor of the City of Indianapolis, do hereby proclaim the 12th day of October as a day of special recognition of the debt of gratitude which we owe to Christopher Columbus; I hereby direct that the Flag of the United States be displayed on all municipal buildings on that day; I hereby respectfully request that such Flag be displayed on all other public buildings, and at all residences and places of business and that the people of this community observe the day with proper ceremonies in his honor."
