

## CHILDREN LEAD CITY'S TRIBUTE ON 'RILEY DAY'

Program Held at Home on Lockerbie St., U. S. Plans Special Stamp.

The sun sparkled on frost on Lockerbie St. this morning, probably a good deal as it did when James Whitcomb Riley lived there.

Schoolchildren gathered there, too, as they did when the Hoosier poet held court and read them the poems they still love.

Teachers guided the pupils into chairs that faced a platform decorated with flowers and flags and containing a radio set.

There was a hush. Then, out of the amplifier a voice read a poem about the ragged man, and another about the frost being on the "pumpkin," as it most certainly was this morning.

### An Omen Perhaps?

Lockerbie St. must have been a good deal today as it was when Mr. Riley lived there—right in the middle of the program a bird swooped over the radio set and talked back to it. It might have been a jay. Mr. Riley once wrote a poem about liking jays best of all birds.

Then, over across the little street, two dogs got into a squabble and the children turned their heads away from the stage to see how serious it was.

And so, for more than a hour, Lockerbie St. again today entertained children.

More dogs growled at each other, grasshoppers struggled through the thick grass of the lawn, birds looked in to see what was going on.

### Schools Note Day

Thus was the 89th anniversary of Riley's birth celebrated at his old home today. It was observed in nearly all schools as children dropped writin' and rithmetic and took up readin' Mr. Riley's poems.

Besides the children who took part in the Lockerbie St. program, old friends of the Hoosier poet grouped around a microphone and recounted some experiences they had with him.

And Rep. Louis Ludlow said that a new stamp commemorating Mr. Riley may be issued next year by the Postoffice Department.

Every Oct. 7 James Whitcomb Riley seems to grow in stature. This year more children attended the ceremony than last.

## SUSPECTS SENT TO TERRE HAUTE

Detroit Holdup Man Admits 19 Robberies in Indianapolis.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7 (U. P.)—Mrs. Thelma M. Sutton, former Indianapolis stenographer, and five others she implicated in an allegedly voluntary statement that the group committed three Indiana holdups, were en route to Terre Haute, Ind., today in custody of four Terre Haute City detectives.

All six were charged in warrants with robbery of a Terre Haute filling station. All waived extradition. The officers left by automobile with the prisoners.

Before their departure, one of the three men in the group was quoted by St. Louis police, who seized all six in a hotel raid here, as saying

"there is 40 years awaiting each of us."

### Holdup Man Says He Learned Technique Here

DETROIT, Oct. 7 (U. P.)—A 39-year-old holdup expert who divided his crimes between Detroit and Indianapolis today awaited sentence after pleading guilty to an armed robbery charge in Recorder's Court.

Wilbur McCall, who confessed to 19 holdups in Indianapolis and 16 in Detroit, said he was taught how to rob by an Indianapolis criminal, Robert Parlor, after both escaped from a Tennessee penitentiary in August, 1936. McCall was serving a sentence for car-theft. Parlor bungled one job and was captured, McCall said.

Wilbur McCall is believed to be the man who escaped in a gun battle with police following a drug-store robbery at 1602 Boulevard Place May 24, detectives here said.

Today, it is not likely that he will be returned here for trial, officers said.

In the drugstore robbery, James White of Birmingham, Ala., was arrested.
