and in the event of my election there is no possibility of his staying in that office," he declared. "Mr. Henry's attack upon his record was perfectly justified," he said, "by the record of arrests, as well as by the evidence any of you can get any Sunday by passing privileged taverns wide open in defiance of the law."

"George Henry knows what conditions are in Indianapolis. He is rightly indignant about them and insistent that they be cleaned up. I am willing to make every statement Mr. Henry made, and to make it stronger."

Five Meetings Tonight

"You have my earnest promise that my election means better conditions in Indianapolis under a Chief of Police who actually will do the job given him to do."

William H. Remy, nominee for Juvenile Court Judge, will be the principal speaker at 1518 Edgemont Ave. The Washington Township Republican Club will hold a supper meeting at the home of Robert S. Smith, Haverstick Park, at 6 p. m.

Walter Glass, nominee for City Clerk, will speak at the Oliver P. Morton Club, 1612 Brookside Ave. Mr. Haerle and Walter Pritchard, nominee for Criminal Court Judge, will address a meeting at 1065 Roache St.

Mr. Haerle told a meeting at 227 N. New Jersey St. last night that Indianapolis citizens "are rising to protest the graft and corruption that has been exposed so frequently in Marion County in recent weeks."

Lauds Ministers' Alliance

He commended several local organizations, including the Baptist Ministers' Alliance of Indianapolis, for their stand against what he called "rampant" gambling and vice in the city.

"I sincerely promise that if I am elected Prosecutor of Marion County, I immediately will investigate the source of these conditions in Marion County and will put forth every effort to rid this City and County of vice and corruption," he said.

G. O. P. Optimistic Over 10th District Chances

The Indiana G. O. P. command today was optimistic over the outcome of campaign efforts to win the 10th District as Raymond E. Willis, Senatorial nominee, concluded his tour there today with an address at Auburn.

Covering nine counties in the District, Mr. Willis sought to turn enough doubtful votes to his cause to achieve a 10 per cent gain over the 1936 Republican vote which he needs for victory.

meeting at Martinsville tomorrow and tentatively is scheduled to speak at an Indianapolis Negro rally.

It is estimated that on the basis of the 1936 returns, a statewide shift of 10 per cent from the Democratic to the Republican column this fall would carry Mr. Willis to Washington.

Seven Districts Lined Up

On the same 10 per cent shift basis, seven Indiana Districts would seat Republican candidates in Congress.

Including the Second District, where the incumbent Charles A. Halleck, is running for re-election, these are the Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Ninth and 10th.

Viewed as one of the strongest G. O. P. champions entered in the Congressional lists this fall is George W. Gillie of Ft. Wayne, Fourth District candidate.

Considerable voting strength also has been hitched up behind Forrest W. Harness, the Fifth District candidate. Mr. Harness acquired international recognition when, as Assistant U. S. Attorney General under President Hoover, he brought the late Samuel Insull back from Greece to face trial in Chicago.

Springer Looks Strong

Twice defeated as a gubernatorial candidate, Raymond S. Springer looks strong as a 10th District Congressional candidate.

Of the seven districts which would come over to the G. O. P. by a 10 per cent shift, the 10th is nearest the margin on the basis of 1936 Congressional voting figures. It may have been that party

strategists had this in mind when they sent two major candidates, James Tucker, Secretary of State nominee, and Mr. Willis, into the district this week to make a concerted drive with Mr. Springer.

A concerted effort was made to sway sentiment in the Fifth District when Homer E. Caphart, "Cornfield Conference" sponsor, and Rep. Hamilton Fish Jr., who represents President Roosevelt's own New York district, shared the platform at Huntington Tuesday night.

Willis Pledges Aid for Aged, Farmers and Business

NEW CASTLE, Oct. 7.—Raymond E. Willis, Republican candidate for the U. S. Senate, last night told Henry County voters that the G. O. P. would propose a constructive program for farmer, businessman, the aged "and others suffering from New Deal experiments."

American farms, he said, would be used to raise crops we now buy from abroad; business would be given "a period of noninterference within limits which do not involve other people's rights," and the Social Security program would be put on a business basis.

Willis Says Farmers Rebel Against 'Dictation'

WINCHESTER, Oct. 7.—Indiana farmers are rebelling against New Deal "dictation" and the "failure" to protect American markets for the American farmer, Raymond E. Willis, Republican Senatorial nominee, told a Randolph County audience here last night.

"It is silly for the Roosevelt Administration to try to increase farm prices and at the same time allow a flood of farm imports to come in from other countries," he said. Asserting that one-third of the

nation was ill-fed while there was an abundance of farm products, Mr. Willis advocated "a constructive program which will utilize our own farms in raising crops for which we have been sending money abroad."

Mr. Willis arrived at the head of a caravan of autos that toured a dozen towns in Wayne and Randolph Counties yesterday.

Workers' Income Increased, Says Townsend

MUNCIE, Oct. 7.—The "increased income" of workers last year as compared with 1932 "is proof that Indiana Democratic administrations have been sympathetic to the welfare of labor," Governor Townsend said here last night.

Speaking at a party rally, the Governor said that working people in this State received 585 million dollars more in 1937 than they did in 1932 in wages and salaries, and the State Government also has passed acts to give the worker more security.

"We believe in State Government that it is to the interests of all the people to increase the welfare of the laboring masses. Those who work in farms and factories and shops are the great producers and the great consumers of goods," he said.

becomes sick, or dies and leaves dependents someone is going to suffer directly and many more indirectly. It is the just obligation of government to prevent this suffering, and to prevent the drop in purchasing power which always injures the community.

"Our Indiana unemployment compensation insurance system has prevented what might have been a serious loss in buying power, what might have meant suffering to thousands. Since April of this year, about 10 million dollars in unemployment insurance benefits have been distributed to our unemployed. During those days when they were working, their employers and the Government were storing up an income for them during an economic famine.

"We have prevented many hours wasted on futile conflict between employer and laborer by the State Labor Division, which has adjusted disputes involving more than 165,000 wage-earners.

"Our program still looks forward, always seeking to adjust the problems of the working people so that they, as well as agriculture and business, may enjoy the greatest amount of security," the Governor declared.

FARLEY PREDICTS SWEEP IN INDIANA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—James A. Farley is unlikely to come to Indiana for a campaign speech, but he is for Senator VanNuys and the entire Democratic ticket from top to bottom, he declared today.

He predicted a Democratic victory for Indiana and declared that not a single congressional seat will be lost by the Hoosier Democrats in November.
