

Hamilton and Knox Arrive To Aid State G. O. P. Ticket; Barkley to Help Democrats

Opponents Obscuring Issues, VanNuys Says At Covington.

Senator Alben Barkley (D. Ky.), U. S. Senate majority leader, and Rep. Samuel Rayburn (D. Tex.), House majority leader, will share speaking assignments in the Indiana Democratic campaign this week. Rep. Rayburn will speak at Clinton tomorrow.

Senator Barkley, who has keynoted the last two Democratic national conventions, will address a northern Indiana rally at Gary Friday.

Other prominent out-of-state Democratic speakers scheduled to speak include Brien McMahon, assistant to the U. S. Attorney General, prosecutor in the Harlan County, Kentucky, coal cases; Rep. SPENCER DUE IN CITY TOMORROW

Special Judge in Vote Cases May Hear Motions By Defense.

Circuit Judge John W. Spencer Jr., of Evansville, will be in Indianapolis tomorrow to qualify as special judge in the cases of 92 primary election workers charged with violating the Indiana election laws.

At the same time, Judge Spencer is expected to receive defense motions and hear arguments. The 92 defendants may be arraigned if motions are disposed of tomorrow, it was reported.

All were indicted last month after three months' investigation of primary ballots.

The investigation was started following disclosures of wide variances in vote totals by recount commissioners in the Democratic Sheriff race.

Al Feeney was certified as the Democratic Sheriff nominee after Charles Lutz, originally declared the winner, withdrew in a Circuit Court contest.

Mr. Lutz had been certified as the nominee with a plurality of 2255 votes. The recount gave Mr. Feeney a 272 lead over Mr. Lutz.

Charges Opponents Obscure Real Issues

Broadcast Saturday to Climax Republican Campaign.

John D. M. Hamilton, Republican national chairman, and Col. Frank Knox, Chicago Daily News publisher, arrived in Indiana today to throw the support of their oratory squarely behind the Hoosier G. O. P. campaign.

Mr. Hamilton will lend his aid to the re-election of Rep. Charles A. Halleck, Indiana's only Republican Congressman, at a Second District Republican rally tonight at Rensselaer.

Mr. Knox, the second Chicago publisher to campaign on behalf of the Republican Party in Indiana in a month, will address a Third District G. O. P. meeting at Elkhart.

In City Tomorrow

Mr. Hamilton tomorrow is scheduled to address a state-wide women's Republican meeting here. Mr. Knox will address a Kokomo rally Thursday.

Another prominent out-of-state speaker scheduled to boost the Indiana G. O. P. campaign is David W. Davis of Idaho, former Assistant Secretary of the Interior, who will speak at Valparaiso Saturday.

Homer E. Capehart, Buffalo industrialist, opens a speaking tour Wednesday in Owensboro, Ky., from which he will swing northward into Indiana for speaking engagements at Petersburg, Thursday, Greenfield Friday and Washington Saturday.

Meanwhile, Raymond E. Willis, Republican Senatorial nominee, was to address a LaPorte meeting this morning and a rally in Michigan City tonight.

Major Talk at Anderson

The candidate will make a major speech at Anderson tomorrow night on the subject of "Labor." He is scheduled to spend the remainder of the week touring the Third District where Robert Grant, Republican, is running for Congress against George N. Beamer, Democrat. Both are from South Bend.

The week's campaign activities will reach a climax Saturday when State leaders and candidates address meetings in the State's 3900 precincts over a state-wide radio hook-up emanating from a cornfield in Capehart Farms, near Washington, Ind.

Young Republicans Plan Dance Saturday

The Indiana Young Republicans will hold a dance for district and county chairmen and vice chairmen in the Riley Room of the Claypool Hotel Saturday night, it was announced today.

The dance, at which 500 are expected, will follow a dinner at 6 p. m. James Tucker, Republican nominee for Secretary of State, will

be the principal speaker. Herbert Nash, Elwood, winner of the State oratorical contest sponsored by the Young Republican clubs of Indiana, also will speak.

Other speakers will include Arch N. Bobbitt, Republican State chairman; Mrs. Eleanor B. Snodgrass, state vice chairman; Felix M. McWhirter, treasurer of the G. O. P. State Committee; and Neil D. McCallum, State Committee secretary.

No National Issues Here, Wolf Declares

Herman C. Wolf, Republican mayoralty nominee, today had condemned what he called an attempt by Democratic County leaders to bring national issues into the Indianapolis City election. He addressed party workers at a meeting Saturday.

"Our opponents would have the people believe that there are national issues involved in this City election," he said. "This is a fragment of a distorted imagination, stemming from the very purposeful aims of the opposition to divert the people's attention from the obvious abuse of their power and authority."

"There is no doubt in my mind that there has been a determined effort to create in Indianapolis and in Marion County a political machine rivaling that of any district Tammany machine that ever existed."

"Let any citizen who doubts me visit Indiana Ave. tomorrow (Sunday). Let him view through the front windows the open bars selling liquor across the counter. Let him view the houses of ill fame operating in the shadow of the State House and the Marion County Court House in open defiance of the law."

"I do not pose as a 'holier than thou' person, but I do maintain that the moral tone of a community cannot rise higher than that of its public officials."

Asserting that only local issues were involved in the City campaign and that the "idealistic philosophy advanced six years ago by President Roosevelt" does not enter into it, the nominee said:

"Those idealistic philosophies never have penetrated the local

Democratic machine rulers, whose sole aim has been only one of self-aggrandizement, intrigue and corruption."

"A truly liberal or progressive government must find its expression down through all the branches of the civic machine, it cannot rest on fine expressions of opinion at the top and a mess of corruption at the bottom."

Mr. Wolf said that without pursuing a "pinch-penny" policy there were some expenditures in City administration which could be eliminated opening the way for tax reduction.

Marion County Republicans today devoted their attention to organizational meetings in the wards and precincts. Six meetings were scheduled for tonight and three for tomorrow.

Charges Gold Policy Aids Soviet Government

TERRE HAUTE, Oct. 24.—Rep. Ralph O. Brewster (R. Me.), former

Maine Governor, charged here Saturday night that the Administration's gold purchases had "in effect financed the Soviet Government."

Assailing the gold buying policies of the New Deal, Rep. Brewster said:

"With the United States Treasury facing constantly mounting deficits, Secretary Henry Morgenthau has started out to corner the gold supply of all the world."

"He has 60 per cent of all the world's gold today buried in Kentucky. Seven billion dollars has been paid for part of this hoard in the last five years and nearly one-half of this vast sum has gone to the Soviet Government of Russia for gold that would otherwise have been a drug upon the market."

"How long," he demanded, "will the overburdened American taxpayer continue to be crucified on the cross of Russian gold?"

The Maine Congressman also asserted that "anarchy" would result from the Administration's farm policy.

"The collapse of farm prices announced the bankruptcy of the New Deal farm program," he declared.
