

G. O. P. OPENS DRIVE TO GET RECOUNT FUND

Seeks \$15,000 From County Groups to Finance Investigations.

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Asby will represent the Governor in making the tabulations. Mr. Hooper said that tabulations will not be completed in the 92 counties in this State for about two weeks, but that returns already certified to the Secretary of State's office will be marked on a chart for public inspection as soon as they have been triple checked.

The committee, following a report of a special legal committee, appointed Saturday, adopted motions outlining the following course of action:

1. Filing of recount petitions in the Circuit Courts of Lake, Marion, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Vermillion and Vigo Counties, by this Saturday.
2. Selection of a commission to co-ordinate and direct the recount.
3. Appointment of Robert D. Armstrong, of the law firm of Noel, Hickam, Boyd and Armstrong, as counsel for the Republican State candidates during the proceedings.

Financing Authorized

4. Authorization of Felix McWhirter, Republican State Treasurer, to bear the expenses of the investigation, including the payment of premiums on surety bonds to be posted with courts where recount petitions are filed, out of money collected by contributions.

5. Filing of quo warranto (by which right proceedings about Jan. 1, 1939, contesting the right of the candidates to take office.

6. Appointment of investigators to gather evidence in the six counties on alleged registration and election irregularities and to collect affidavits from persons having knowledge of irregularities.

7. As Republicans prepared to take recount action for their defeated candidates, Edward D. Koenenman, Evansville, apparently defeated Democratic candidate for Secretary of State, was to confer today with Attorney General Omer Stokes Jackson to arrange for a recount of ballots in several counties.

Other Recounts Sought

Democratic state leaders were quoted as saying that they would ask a recount in Wayne, Randolph and Porter Counties, which returned Republican majorities according to unofficial tabulations.

The only major candidate of either party apparently satisfied with the result of the election was U. S. Senator Van Nuys, who issued the following statement over the week-end:

"It is my belief that I was elected to the U. S. Senate by a majority of the lawful votes in the last general election in Indiana. The returns show this to be the fact and validity of these returns cannot properly be challenged by mere political propaganda.

"If my opponent (Raymond E. Willis) honestly believes that he was elected to the Senate of the United States, he has full opportunity to attempt to prove that fact by competent evidence in a tribunal duly constituted to decide that controversy.

"I have no knowledge of the existence of any irregularities or fraud in the election. I have tried to conduct my campaign honestly and I have heard no claim asserted even by my most partisan critics that I have been guilty of fraud or the use of dishonest means."

The Senator said that he did not desire to retain office if his opponent could establish the fact that he was chosen, but insisted that the issue be decided by an investigation and hearing.

He said he has retained the law firm of Thompson & Rabb and Daily, O'Neal, Dalley and Eitzyonson to represent his interests in the controversy.

Funds Sought

Immediately following yesterday's meeting, Arch N. Bobbitt, G. O. P. state chairman, telegraphed requests to the 92 Republican chairmen in the State to begin raising funds immediately.

Each county will be asked to contribute about \$200, which would raise a total fund of \$18,000 to finance the investigation for which \$15,000 is needed.

Excess money will be used to further contest proceedings in January, Mr. Bobbitt said.

Federal action in impounding ballots in the counties under investigation was postponed, pending action by the State courts.

Judge Noel Neal, campaign manager of Raymond E. Willis, apparently defeated G. O. P. Senatorial candidate, said county clerks were responsible for preserving ballots and voting machines under the State law.

"Wherever we find that ballots and machines have not been preserved," he said, "we will move forward in the State and Federal Courts."

Arthur Rogers, of Washington, G. O. P. nominee for the State Supreme Court from the first district and member of the State Committee's legal committee for the investigation, said that the committee contemplated no action in Federal District Court on behalf of Republican State candidates.

The State candidates, he said, can file their recount petitions in the State Courts.

Must Gather Evidence

"The U. S. Senate," he said, "will act for Mr. Willis. We must gather evidence through this recount to show a Senate committee that there was fraud in this election."

"I personally feel that this election has been won by the Republican State ticket."

Paul R. Bausman, editor of the Washington (Ind.) Herald read a telegram from Foster Riddick, Republican Editorial Association president, pledging the association's full support in the investigation.

'Good Citizen' Wins High Praise; 13 Killed in Indiana Accidents

A 'Fine Thing,' Judge Tells Youth Who Nabbed Alleged Drunk.

A "good citizen" received the praise of Municipal Judge Charles J. Karabell today for helping apprehend an alleged drunken driver. Curtis Isaacs of 1229 Martin St., a serious, light-haired youth, received the Judge's commendation after he told how he caught Robert Clayborn, 23, of 337 S. Holmes Ave., in an auto chase through southeast Indianapolis Saturday night. Mr. Isaacs said he was seated in his parked car when Clayborn passed and struck another parked car nearby.

"I saw he wasn't going to stop," Mr. Isaacs explained, "so I took out after him. I followed him to a traffic light where we stopped, and I went over to his car. He hit me. I took his ignition key out, but it didn't stop the motor."

"Good for you," Judge Karabell said. "You are to be congratulated. If we had all people like you, we would break up this drunken driving."

Branding the alleged offense, "a vicious case," the judge fined Clayborn \$50 and costs and sentenced him to 30 days on the State Penal Farm on the drunken driving charge, and fined him \$25 and costs and sentenced him to 180 days on the State Farm on charges of being drunk.

His driver's license was revoked for one year.

State Police Get Orders to Begin Confiscation Drive On Gaming Devices.

Back After 14 Years as 'Dead' Man

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14 (U. P.).—A former wealthy stockbroker who left two suicide notes 14 years ago and was declared legally dead, reappeared today.

He had remarried and had two sons. His former wife, who believed him dead and collected his insurance, also remarried.

The man was Davis R. MacDonald, former wealthy Pittsburgh broker and wartime aviator. He was arrested as John Edgar Davis after a check he wrote was not honored by the bank. A routine check of his fingerprints by the Federal Bureau of Investigation revealed his identity.

"I was in trouble when I disappeared," he said to John Hanson, of the Los Angeles FBI office, "I fully intended to commit suicide and I should have gone ahead with it. But I was a coward."
